### Camp Lewis Letter.

Camp Lewis, Wash., July 31.-Authority has been received from the War Department to initiate educational and vocational training at this camp, in addition to the military training received. Any young man wishing to enlist is permitted to choose the Arm of the Service in which he cares to enlist. Any soldier, serving in whatever Arm is permitted, not required, to undertake educational or vocational training three hours daily during five days of the week. It is believed that educational opportunity, furnished young men who have not yet entered college or learned a trade, will induce a large number of young men, unmarried, to enter the army for the purpose of inreasing their earning capacity after lischarge, or for the purpose of enterng college in a higher grade then be would otherwise enter. This educational advantage is in additional to the other privileges according soldiers of the army. The present pay and allowances, such as clothing, subsistence, quarters, medical attention, dental Gold Beach-County paving 2-mile treatment, life insurance, etc., are usually estimated at \$100 per month.
