Roseburg, July 29.—Friends of John Karis, the Greek who is confined in the county jail charged with robbery of Frank Trovick, near Scottsburg, will arrive here this evening to furnish bail to release Karis from jail. The amount of bail is placed at \$3000. M. A. It is claimed he robbed the robbers—but he maintains his innocence, and says he can explain his case satisfactorily. Simple Utensils Help Canning. A fruit funnel makes for more rapid filling of jars than the old-fashioned method of the spoon or dipper only. It is an aid even in the cold pack method of canning. Colanders are obtainable which are much more satisfactory for making butter or jam than the ricer or the colander plus the potato masher. This colander clamps to the table and has an attachment which is turned by hand forcing the fruit through. It may also be used for purees or riced potatoes. A syrup ladle with its broad bowl and pointed lip is more convenient than a dipper or spoon because it fits into the mouth of the jar and prevents dripping. It is also convenient when the open kettle method is used for small-fruit or berry canning. Marmalade or jelly lessens the amount of stirring necessary, since they prevent scorching of the product by their dancing, scraping motion. Gummied paper—five cents purchases a large quantity—is a help in canning. Mark the name of the fruit or vegetable and the date on the gummied label before storing. This aids in keeping the products rotating from year to year and identifies them in the store-room. Contract for paving 12-mile stretch between Eugene and Junction let for \$225,000.50. THE FOREST FIRE EVIL. More Southern Oregon Fire Trespass Prosecutions. Investigation into the Anderson creek fire, in the Crater National Forest, west of Talent, disclosed that the Salsig Lumber Company had been operating a donkey engine, using a home-made spark arrester entirely inadequate for stopping sparks. July 14 a big fire started in a snag and burned over three hundred acres. W. W. Salsig, manager of the Lumber Company, pleaded guilty before Justice Taylor, of Medford, and was fined \$25.00 and costs. Warrants were issued recently for Zera Dabaek, on the charge of leaving a camp fire burning up Griffin Gulch which burned over one hundred acres. His trial will be held Monday, and also that of C. J. Hogger for burning slash without a permit. On the middle fork of the Applegate, near the interstate boundary line, J. J. Wingham and G. F. Eckles set fire to a bee tree and thought they had put out the smudge, but it later spread over about twenty acres. Messrs. Wingham and Eckles are now fighting some of the numerous lighting fires, but will be called in by phone from Medford to Yreka, California, for trial, and it is understood they will plead guilty. Two other fire trespass cases are awaiting trial,—one involving a fire down the Applegate supposed to have been started by a cigarette, and the other the burning of brush without a permit.

THE AEROPLANE. Jacksonville Men Says It's Great Stuff. The Medford owned aeroplane, which so much has been read about in the dailies, has made quite a record the past week in carrying passengers. Several Medford people have availed themselves of the opportunity of placing themselves, or rather permitting themselves to be placed, above the level of their associates, as well as a goodly number of people from other cities and sections of the valley.
