State Board of Health Reports City Water to be Safe for Domestic Use.

A report received this week from the State Board of Health states that a recent sample of the water stored in the city dam on Jackson creek, is free from contamination and safe for use. The report included among other things the information that the count per cubic centimeter was 300 and that no colon was recovered after 72 hours incubation.

Farmers Week Begins December 29th.

Farmers week at O. A. C. has been set for the week beginning December 29th. The general committee appointed by O. D. Center, extension director, reported in favor of programs giving the farmer students the full benefit of college information in various lines of agriculture and home economics. A special committee has been appointed to coordinate the various courses so the farmers and farmer wives may either take a special course in any important phase of farming, or take less work in general farming. The college forces will make this the best farmers week ever held in Oregon.

SCOTT—Walter Wayland Scott died at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. P. D. Scott, one and one-half miles west of Jacksonville, on August 6, 1919, at the age of 21 years. Walter was a native of South Dakota and came to Medford with his parents in 1905, and had resided there until two years ago when he moved with his family to Jacksonville. He attended the Washington school for eight years where he was very popular among his fellow students, and leaves a host of young friends to mourn his untimely end. He was a member of Company D, Third Oregon Infantry of Medford and served in the home militia during the war.

He leaves to mourn his loss beside his mother and father, two brothers and two sisters, Leo Scott in the U. S. Marine Corps, stationed at Mare Island, Willis J. Scott of Pendleton, Myrtle and Ione of Jacksonville. The funeral services were held Friday morning at Medford.

JACKSONVILLE MAN TO VISIT EAST.

J. B. Renault to Attend National Convention of G. A. R.

John B. Renault, for many years a resident of this city, expects to leave next month for an extended visit in the eastern states. Mr. Renault will first attend the National Convention of the G. A. R., to which he is a delegate. The Convention is to be held at Columbus, Ohio.

From there Mr. Renault will go farther east for a visit with friends and relatives in that section. John says that this will be his first visit in the east since 1865. At the close of the Civil War he left the east, working his way west, first settling in various states in the Rocky mountain region; finally coming to Oregon. He expects to be gone over a month, possibly two.

Oregon Farmers Look to Station.

Oregon farmers are justified in looking to their college experiment station for help in solving their most important problems declared Dr. E. R. Faint, official inspector of the federal experiment station, after a thorough inspection of the experiment and administrative work at O. A. C. Strong and competent staffs are at work on problems of greatest economic interest, he said, and have gone about their solution in the right way. Many things that would cost the farmer much time and money to learn for himself are discovered by the station and given to the farmer interested.

The department of labor reminds us that on account of suspended building operations during the war, the United States now needs almost a million new homes. We are also reminded that building is a basic industry, and that if you build a home you make business for more than a hundred correlated and contributing industries: each building erected sends its wave of demand through the industrial organization of the country from the ditch-diggers to the bank presidents and back, by way of pay envelopes, to the ditch diggers again.
