JACKSONVILLE TO HAVE MILL.

Gagnon Sawmill Plant Moved to this City.

The plant of the Gagnon Lumber company, which was recently destroyed by fire at Medford, is to be rebuilt in this city.

Arrangements were made early in the week for securing a site and the location of the old cyanide plant on Jackson creek, consisting of 40 acres, has been purchased and operations of setting the foundations and getting the mill in shape for running are now underway.

At the time the mill was destroyed Mr. Gagnon had a multitude of orders for lumber and boxes, which he estimated would insure steady operation for several months.

New machinery has been received from Portland and is now already on the ground, ready to be installed. The mill will likely employ twenty or thirty men, which will likely mean that same number of families for Jacksonville.

It is estimated that Mr. Gagnon now has title to enough timber in this region to keep his mill in steady operation for ten years or longer.

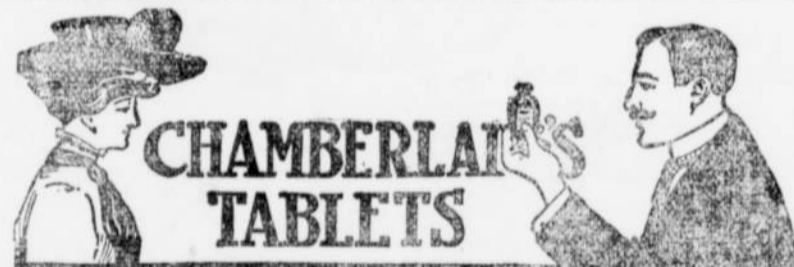
