Editor The Jacksonville Post, Jacksonville, Oregon.

Dear Sir:—I see your article on "Get Or The Job" as our duty to our community. I am glad our new Editor is starting out with a snar on. If we just had a few more like him we might get there. But with the old moss backs and knockers—we are where we are—sitting around smoking their pipes, patting their feet and "well we've got it all, no use, nothing more", etc.

Mr. Editor—I am only a woman—but I only see one way out of it and I am going to put it up to you and then I want to know if you are not of the same mind. No use to try to get any one interested in quartz mining around here—especially those who have got it all in the placer field.

But what I have to suggest is this—we who have good properties to make a united appeal to the government for an appropriation to open our mines and get the necessary equipment such as mills, concentrators etc. and money to build chutes and roads to bring out our produce, and later we can build a smelter.

By concentrating our ores we can then afford to ship it until we can get ahead so as to get some company interested to build us a smelter. If we can get a start and men who have mines will rally to us and stop backbiting his neighbors mine in order to get in first, we can make a success. We have the minerals and our ledges speak for themselves, thousands of tons of tons running from \$5.00 to \$200.00. What more do they want? I have known of companies milling ore that only run eighty cents to the ton and they made money.

I think Mr. Editor, we should get up a legal paper as to our possessions in mining properties, and give our honest opinions as to what can be done in our district, and offer the government a per cent of our returns until they are paid their appropriation with interest.

We will never get any where without making an effort, and if we wait for some one here to offer us a loan we will turn gray and then green before it happens. And if we undertake to work this up, lets be sure to get the right ones on the job. We don't want any war stunts to be practised on us. We want no freeze outs or pull outs. We want it started fair and right (and keep it so.) If we see a man make a crooked move—put him down and out—not wait until he gets it all in his pocket and then kick.

Steady about this and let me hear from you.
