In Jackson county quartz mining has been neglected! Why? Just simply because no one has had the gumption to try working it on a paying scale.

In the mountains around Jacksonville and in the country tributary to Jacksonville, there are mineral deposits that have never felt the miner's pick, nor have yet seen the light of day. Why? Because no one has felt sufficient interest in quartz mining to hunt them out systematicaly.

To be sure under the present system of quartz mining in Jackson county, nothing else could be looked for. Now a man stakes out a claim, does his assessment work and sits down to wait for someone to come along and buy it. My friend it can't be done.

What the miners of this section need is for them to get together and make arrangements for working their properties on a paying basis. And everybody knows that it is not a paying proposition to ship the ore four or five hundred miles to a smelter. Life is to short for that. You may possibly made expenses and sometimes a little over, but imagine the saving if all that rail transportation

Situated close to the city limits and within the city limits of Jacksonville are several natural sites for a smelter. Imagine the amount of valuable mining land that could be worked profitably. But you will have to get on the job.

The scheme could be floated without outside capital, say on a co-operative basis.

With a smelter or other efficient reducing process located here, Jacksonville would be the Mecca of thousands of miners and men of experience in up-to-date mining.

But never in a thousand years will you get anywhere if you do nothing but sit around hoping and wishing for the town to boom.
