Standardizing Our Schools.

War conditions prevented some work being done in the way of improving our schools that would have been done otherwise. The war offered a just reason for extreme economy. Now that those conditions no longer exist, much will be done in the way of advancing the standard of the schools. Many school boards have thus expressed their intentions.

The new standard school placard is not out but should be received soon.

The following requirements should be easily met by every district in the county:—the flag to fly on all school days, rooms to be attractive at all times, the purchase of at least one new picture, sanitation to be good, (individual cups, etc.), and visits by school officers. In many cases the expenditure of a few dollars would raise

the matter of equipment, heating and ventilating, and play grounds up to standard. A few of our schools lack only a sufficient number of library books of being standard. In those cases fifteen to thirty dollars spent for library books would give these schools honor positions on the map. The matter of lighting is in many cases much more serious. But, where the lighting is extremely bad and the building in good condition otherwise, it is well worth the expenditure of a hundred dollars to correct the lighting. The beginning of the year is the proper time to give these matters serious attention.—By Supervisor R. E. Morris.
