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A MATTER OF DOLLARS AND CENTS

Mr. Average Citizen, if you knew that by spending one dollar in improvements, you would receive four dollars worth of improvements, would you take advantage of the fact. If you knew that by spending one dollar in road improvements, the county would receive one dollar from the state and two dollars from the United States, would you be in favor of road improvements.

If you knew that if Jackson county was to pave one mile of road, the State of Oregon would pay for paving one additional mile, and the United States would pay for paving two additional miles, would you vote in favor of improving the roads?

Such are conditions as are existing today. The state of Oregon has made appropriations to meet the road building question. The state stands ready to cover any amount raised by Jackson county. And the United States will cover any amount raised by both Jackson county and the State of Oregon.

We simply put up a certain amount, the state puts up a like amount and the United States puts up an amount equal to what the county and state combine put up.

Never was there a better opportunity for road building. We build four miles of road and pay for one.

CALLED TO REST.

Jacksonville Boy Passes Great Divide. Military Funeral Held.

Edward David Beery, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Beery of this city, died at Camp Lewis, Washington, Sunday September 14, 1919, shortly after being operated on for varicose veins.

Edward had been injured in France, where he had been serving with Company E, 319 Engineers, A. E. F., and had been informed that an operation would be necessary upon his return to the States. At Camp Lewis the information was given out that the operation would only be a minor matter, and could be done with absolutely no danger.

At the news of Edward's death the entire community was shocked and it will be many days before the people will be composed again.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at the Presbyterian Church in this city, Rev. A. H. Gammons officiating. The pallbearers consisted of ex service men in uniform, a fitting tribute to one of our heroes who gave his life for his country.

Services at the grave were conducted by the Medford Post of the American Legion, Captain Ralph Cowgill being in charge. The usual volleys were fired over the casket and the enormous crowd which had gathered in reverence to a true blooded American soon dispersed.

The Post joins with the entire community in extending heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved.

Young Fighter Speaks to Large Crowd. Given Rousing Welcome.

Lieutenant Colonel Roosevelt spoke to one of the largest and most appreciative audiences assembled in Medford in years, on his visit to that city Tuesday evening.

The Colonel was brought from Ashland to Medford in an automobile, and spoke about twenty minutes, and each word was full of thrill and interest for the listeners. The talk was generally along the lines of the American Legion, which Colonel Roosevelt practically organized by his own efforts.

After time he was interrupted by the cheers of the crowd, and then the speaker would give the famous Roosevelt smile.

The listeners were representative of every region and occupation in Jackson county, a very large delegation from this city being in attendance.

OBITUARY.

BEERY—Edward David Beery, died at Camp Lewis, Washington, Sunday September 14, 1919, aged 25 years, seven months and twenty-two days. He was born at Lost River, Idaho, January 22, 1894. Edward lived at his birthplace until 1905, when 12 years old, the family moved to this city, where they have since resided. He attended the Jacksonville public schools, where he won the respect of teachers and pupils alike. In February, 1918, he enlisted in the U. S. Army and was assigned to duty with Company E, 319 Engineers. With his company he went to France, where he was awarded two gold chevrons. He leaves to mourn his loss: his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. James Beery of this city, two brothers, Edwin D. and Charles H. of this city and two sisters, Mrs. Ester Wilson of Portland and Mrs. Cora Ravenor, of Salt Lake, Utah. Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon, Rev. Gammons officiating, interment in Jacksonville cemetery.
