Jasten Hartman is building two bridges on the Pacific Highway, and has them both well underway.

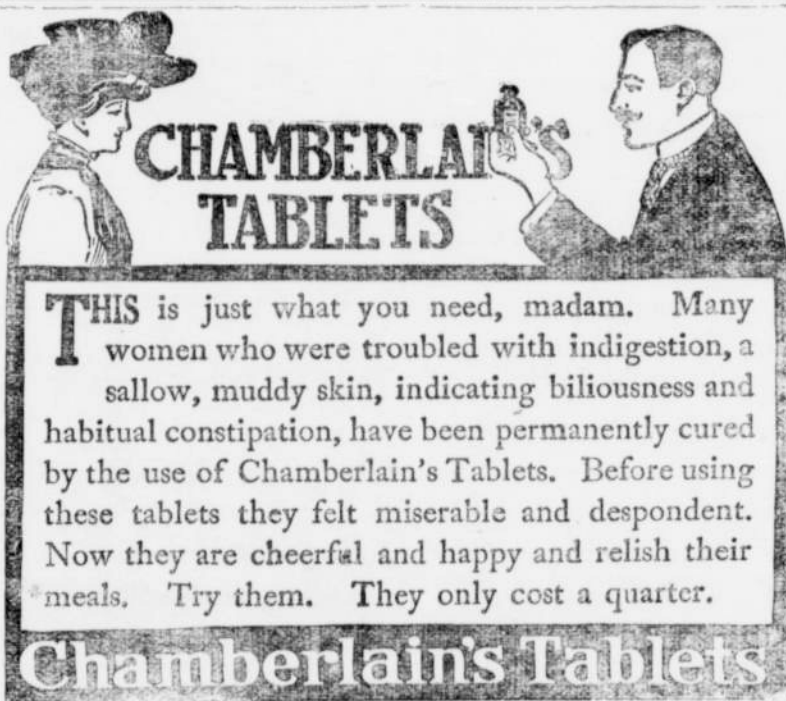
