"POST" BAWLED OUT AGAIN.

This week we received a communication from a subscriber's wife requesting that their copy of the "Post" be discontinued. The reason given, as best that we could figure, was that the "Post" is un-American.

Just what gave the subscriber the impression that we are un-American, is hard to determine, presumably it was the article on the American Legion, published last week, or possibly it was the publication of the resolutions adopted by the Medford Post of the American Legion.

Then we are accused of advocating the suppression of free press, and we ask where in the name of Peter did she get that impression? As for the only case of boycott recently practiced in Jackson county, that of the Pacific Record Herald, we never expressed an opinion one way or the other.

If anything appearing in the Jacksonville Post can be construed as un-American, we want to know it. We invite Mrs. Bliven to trot out her evidence.

As to the Americanism of the Jacksonville Post, is is 100 per cent American, the editor being at least native born.

While of course, we are sorry to lose any of our subscribers, still the "Post" managed to scrimp along before Horace Bliven and Phila Bliven, his wife ever saw the paper, and we will endeavor to continue.

At the present time there are two vacancies in the city offices. It is very likely that the city council will take steps to fill these officers at their meeting next Tuesday night. Now is the time to show up if you want one of the jobs. Don't sit back and make remarks about the administration. Come out and try for the job yourself.

If in order to support an organization like the American Legion, we must lose the support of our subscribers, then the first thing we know the "Post" will be without readers. The American Legion is an organization for good, and not for evil, and the "Post" is tied to it.

One thing that we must ask, is that when writing to make remonstrances, all subscribers must please translate their own communications.

HENRY G. DOX PASSES AWAY.

Old Time Citizen of Jacksonville Crosses Great Divide.

Henry G. Dox, born in Michigan, August 17, 1853, died at the Sacred Heart Hospital, Medford, September 29, 1919, after an illness of several years.

Early in life Mr. Dox came to southern Oregon, and soon after arriving here he became associated with Silas J. Dox, in the abstract business. Leaving this business, Mr. Dox accepted a position with Beckman's Banking House, as cashier, a position which he held until the liquidation of the bank a few years ago.

Mr. Dox was agent for the Wells Fargo Express company for years and only recently resigned the position because of ill health. For years Mr. Dox held the position of Justice of the Peace of the Jacksonville district, an office which he held at the time of his death. Along with this office, he for years held a city office, that of city recorder, and at the time of his death he held the office of city treasurer.

His daughter, Mrs. Pearl Hollingsworth, and grand daughter, Audrey Hollingsworth, of Medford, are the only family survivors.

Funeral services were held Thursday afternoon at the Jacksonville cemetery, conducted by Rev. Myron Boozer, of Medford.
