SOUTHERN OREGON HIT BY STORM.

Telephone and Electric Lights Out of Order. Medford Coast Line Suspends Operations.

The northern part of Oregon was hit by a storm during the fore part of the week and residents of the Rogue river valley who were snow-bound in Portland, sent requests for a bit of Southern Oregon weather. But, they crowded too soon.

Wednesday afternoon and evening we were treated to a real old fashioned rain storm, followed by one of the hardest snowfalls in history. Thursday morning the residents of the city awoke to find ten inches of snow on the ground.

Telephone wires and electric wires were down, stopping communication with the rest of the valley. Poles had fallen down and several trees were broken by the weight of snow.

Traffic on the Medford Coast line has been discontinued for the present. The mail has been brought up from Medford by Lewis Ulrich, the postmaster.

The stages to Copper and Applegate made their trips as usual, Mr. Knox reporting about fifteen inches of snow on the top of the Jacksonville hill and about ten inches at Applegate.

The traffic on the S. P. was suspended for a while but mail trains are now moving.

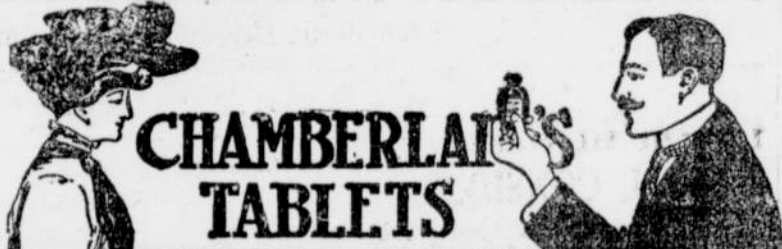
