Water Protects Coal.
 An interesting result of recent experiments with coal is the demonstration of the benefits of submerging the mineral in water. Coal deteriorates in the air, and there is the danger of spontaneous combustion, while when submerged not only was the fire danger eliminated, but scarcely any deterioration was shown. Experimentally, coal kept in the air showed from 2 to 10 per cent of loss in nine months, while when submerged there was scarcely any loss at all.

IMPROVEMENT CLUB COMPLETES ORGANIZATION.

To Ask Legislature For Road Construction.

The newly formed Improvement Club held their second meeting at the City Hall Wednesday evening, about seventy-five residents being present.

G. A. Gardner, as chairman of the Committee on Constitution and By-Laws, presented the report of that committee, which was accepted by the club. The constitution provides for meeting on each second and fourth Monday of the month, and prescribes an assessment of twenty-five cents on each member per month. Low dues it is thought, will insure a much larger membership.

Mr. Hanna, presented a report of the committee previously appointed to take up the transportation service between this city and Medford.

Col. Sargent spoke on the matter of a clean-up campaign, and was followed by much discussion by the members.

Lewis Ulrich spoke concerning a paved road to the Applegate valley. Comment was made on the project. Being asked for an explanation of the possibilities of such a piece of work, Judge Gardner discussed the matter and suggested a plan whereby the deal could be put through.

The Club decided to send a committee to interview our representative in the State Legislative Assembly, asking their support in securing legislation favorable to road building in this section of the state.

Officers elected for the ensuing term were: President, A. H. Gammons; Vice-President, H. K. Hanna; Treasurer Mrs. Fieta Chapman; Secretary D. W. Bagshaw, Jr. Fourty six residents of the town signified their intention of becoming members by paying their first month's dues at the meeting. This is considered a very good showing.
