Picture Lore. To paste new paper on picture backing, cut the paper the proper size float it in water till it is quite wet, apply the paste to the frame and, wiping off actual drops from the paper, press it in place. As the paper dries it shrinks, stretching smooth. If you want to hang a small picture from an invisible wire and find difficulty in locating a beam in which to make it fast, run your eye along the mopboard till you see where that is nailed. Hang the picture in a line with that. Small pictures hung on wire nails with taut wire won't show the wire nor skew on their nails, if two nails are used to pass the wire over instead of one. To prevent ugly dust lines on the paper behind pictures drive a small brass-headed tack in each lower corner of the frame to hold it out from the wall so air can circulate behind it.
