

Possibility of Sugar Production.

In laying its plans next year, the Great Western Sugar Co., the largest beet sugar company in the world, has promised to make additional payments per ton of beets above the guaranteed price of \$12 provided the seaboard net price of sugar during November-January exceeds 11 cents per pound and provided the total sugar production of the coming campaign exceeds 5 1/2 million bags of sugar.

During 6 year period, 1912-1919, the Great Western's yield of granulated sugar per acre harvested in all our territories has been about 29.8 bags. Therefore 184,000 normal acres harvested will produce about 5 1/2 million bags of sugar.

In spring of 1919 this company contracted about 265,000 acres. There is a normal shrinkage between contracted and harvested acreage of about 9.6 per cent. Therefore, if the company contracts same acreage as last year it may expect about 239,600 harvested acres and at 29.8 bags per acres it may expect about 7,100,000 bags.

With acreage already contracted there is every reason to expect that the 5 1/2 million bag mark will easily be exceeded.

Living Western Metals.

Metal mining in the west, in spite of abnormal business activity, has passed through one of the hardest periods of its existence. Generally speaking the price of our basic metals was out of all proportion to cost of mining them. Labor efficiency has been low and wage scales high and curtailed output has added to total cost of production.

Copper producers have been among those hardest hit and the industry as a whole has been giving serious thought to its future and has determined to branch out in two directions.

First new avenues of consumption will be sought while attempts will be made to encourage the rehabilitation of copper into uses formerly in vogue but interrupted during the war. As an example brass instead of tin nickel-plate for automobile trimmings; brass headlights nicked or painted instead of tin as used at present which rusts through the nickel or paint in a few months.

The next step will be the financing of export sales through a system of credits.

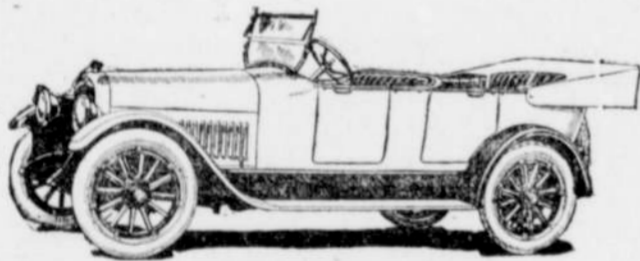
