EDITORIAL.

The continuation of America's free institutions like the state universities, agricultural colleges and normal schools is necessary as a safeguard against

anarchy on the one hand, and aristocracy and reaction on the other. The higher education in any one of these institutions pays the state over and over again for its money paid out by giving it in return improved citizenship, improved agricultural methods, improved dairying, horticulture, factory industries, better trained doctors, lawyers, teachers, journalists, scientists home-makers and business men.

Universities and colleges are necessary also as a finishing point of the present public school system, because they give the children of the poor equal higher educational advantages with the children of the rich.

But at the present time these institutions of Oregon are facing a serious crisis. Under the existing taxation laws, they can no longer accommodate the large number of students who flock

there because they lack room, equipment and teaching force, and their income is not sufficient to cover the cost of these necessities. If the Higher Educational Tax Act does not carry at the election, May 21, it will be necessary for these institutions to re-use to admit the hundreds of students who will graduate from the high schools this year, and in succeeding years. Hence it will be necessary for parents to send their children to colleges which will accept them outside of this state, or curtail the rising generation's life plans by denying them the advantages of a higher education.

## The State University Agricultural College and the State Normal

have for many years spent less money per student per year in training Oregon boys and girls than is spent at any other state institution. The present cost at the State University is \$203 a year; at the college, it is \$180. But even before the war, when money would buy twice as much as it buys now, the average cost at all other state institutions was \$325 a year. In addition

## Their Building Investment is also very low

At the State University it is at present \$322 per student; at the College, \$300. But in state institutions elsewhere, statistics show the average to be \$395. These are convincing proofs of economical administration, but the three institutions can no longer give satisfactory training to the vast number of Oregon boys and girls (5400 in fulltime courses alone) unless they receive more support. On May 21 the Higher Educational relief measure will appear on the ballot. You are urged to preserve the quality of higher education by voting for it.
