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FOR PRESIDENT **HARDING** FOR VICE-PRESIDENT **COOLIDGE**

Warren G. Harding, the Republican party's choice for president, now nearing the end of his first term as United States Senator from Ohio, is called a self-made man, says the Chicago Tribune. He was in turn a farmer boy, member of a railroad construction gang, country school teacher, printer's devil, linotype operator, publisher, business man and banker before he became a commanding figure in the political life of the nation.

He is descended from two pioneer American families, hardy Holland Dutch on the one side and liberty loving Scotch on the other. He was born on his grandfather's farm just outside the village of Blooming Grove, Ohio, Nov. 2, 1865. His father, Dr. George T. Harding, still a practicing physician in Marion, O., despite his advanced age-76 years- was then a struggling country doctor.

Young Harding attended the village school until he was fourteen, when he entered the Ohio Central college at Ibero. He worked his way through school by cutting corn, painting his neighbor's barns and helping to grade the road bed of the T. & O. C. railroad. He also played a cornet in the village band and was editor of the college paper.

Upon his graduation from college he went to work in the village printing office. When he was 19 his father moved to Marion and aided him in acquiring control of the Marion Star, of which he is still publisher. The senator learned to set type himself and when the linotype was introduced learned to operate that. The pocket piece he still carries is the old printer's rule he used in those days.

Senator Harding is a director in a bank, director in several large manufacturing plants and a trustee of Trinity Baptist church in his home town.

Library Aids Blind.

The development of library service for the blind, in which the Jackson County Library is interested, was urged before the recent annual conference of the American Library Association by one of the only two American commissioned officers blinded in the war. Lieutenant Frank Schoble, of Philadelphia, whose optic nerves were severed by a shot that pierced his skull in the Argonne fighting in October in 1918, told the several hundred librarians from the United States and Canada assembled at Colorado Springs that 50,000 blind in the country depend upon public libraries and the A. L. A. to help them out of darkness.

Only thirty-five per cent of the 75,000 blind of the nation have learned to read, due largely to the excessive cost of books in raised type and the bewildering diversity of types in use, an obstacle removed by the adoption of a uniform, simple braille type. The 200 blinded service men returning to civil life were aided by the American Library Association, said Lieutenant Schoble, through the printing of about forty books in the uniform type, chiefly books on trades and vocations suitable for the sightless. The A. L. A. is aiding all blind in the United States by promoting the publication of books in the uniform type on a non-commercial basis, thereby bringing the price of the books within reach of individuals and of libraries. Small public libraries will be able to serve their blind patrons by borrowing books from the larger libraries, as books for the blind may be sent free through the mails.

Please report to the librarian the names and addresses of any persons in the county who can use these books in raised type and the service will be started at once.
