Warned by Sandpaper Label. A device for protecting people from taking doses from poison bottles by mistake is a sandpaper label. The ordinary label is pasted on a piece of sandpaper large enough to go all round the bottle, so that when anyone takes up the bottle in the night, no matter how dazed from sleep he may be, the rough unfamiliar feel of the sandpaper arouses him and he recognizes at once that the bottle contains poison of some description. The printed label tells the kind of poison in the bottle.

Blow-Resisting Paper Caps. Astonishingly strong paper caps, capable of withstanding powerful blows, though extremely light in weight, have been invented by a shipyard employee, and are intended to be worn by workmen whose duties expose them to danger from falling objects. The process by which the novel headgear is produced has not been divulged, says Popular Mechanics, but it is known that chemicals are employed to harden the material, without adding to its weight. Several styles have been made, the lightest weighing about seven ounces, and others only slightly more. In a recent test, a one-pound bolt was dropped on one of them from a height of 40 feet, with the result that a barely perceptible dent was made in the paper. The novel head coverings are proof against water and acids, and are poor conductors of electricity.

Mnemonic for Grams. Scientific papers are getting to use the metric system of weights and measures more and more, and it has become almost necessary for every one to be able to convert such terms as grams into ounces at once. It is not however, easy to remember that there are 28.35 grams in an ounce. However, if one remembers the sentence, "It converts one ounce," the figures will instantly recur to the mind. For the number of letters in each word gives 2-8-3-5.

PIES and PASTRIES

Plain Pastry
This recipe is for one large pie with top and bottom crust
2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup cold water
Sift together flour, salt and baking powder; add shortening and rub in very lightly with tips of fingers (the less it is handled the better the paste will be). Add cold water very slowly, enough to hold dough together (do not work or knead dough). Divide in halves; roll out one part thin on floured board and use for bottom crust. After pie is filled roll out other part for top.
Rich Pastry
2 cups pastry flour
1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup cold water
Sift flour, baking powder and salt; add one-half shortening and rub in lightly with fingers; add water slowly until of right consistency to roll out. Divide in halves; roll out one half thin; put on in small pieces half remaining shortening; fold upper and lower edges in to center; fold sides in to center, fold sides to center again; roll out thin and put on pie plate. Repeat with other half for top crust.
Apple Pie
1 1/2 cups flour
1/2 teaspoon Royal Baking Powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons shortening
4 apples, or 1 quart sliced apples
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon milk
Sift flour, baking powder and salt; add shortening and rub in very lightly; add just enough cold water to hold dough together. Roll half out on floured board, line bottom of pie plate; fill in apples, which have been washed, pared and cut into thin slices; sprinkle with sugar; flavor with cinnamon or nutmeg; wet edges of crust with cold water; roll out remainder of pastry; cover pie, pressing edges tightly together and bake in moderate oven 30 minutes.
