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Whether business inexperience, criminal negligence or something more sinister is responsible for the failure of the Bank of Jacksonville the result is the same; business houses are temporarily crippled, years' savings of depositors swept away and a hardship worked upon every family in town. Yet all are accepting their losses with admirable fortitude and are facing the future with unshaken courage. If a "good loser" is more to be admired than a winner, Jacksonville at this time is entitled to the admiration of her neighbors. Perhaps the greatest bitterness lies in the generally expressed belief that for three years or longer customers of the bank have been systematically deceived by a man in whom was reposed the greatest confidence and trust. This breach of public confidence is felt even more keenly than the monetary loss and naturally leads to the query: "Whom can we trust? There is no denying that Jacksonville has been hard hit and effects of the blow will be felt for some time, but the fighting spirit engendered by our present difficulties is good evidence that we shall emerge with flying colors.

Apropos of what Art. Perry had to say about us in Smudge Pot col. of Monday's Trib., we believe he is right. As the Post carries more legal advertisements than any other paper in the county it would probably be unlawful to utilize it as patches on paper suits. Also, why go so far afield? Medford people should find little difficulty in obtaining patches of but slightly inferior durability right at home, thus avoiding the possibility of court injunction.

A year went by and the remains of a man named Reed was found on the Harris ranch, and search was renewed for Davey but without result, and the pines whispered to the sad and sorrowing women, "Never! and never more!"

Little Sophia, afterward the wife of John S. Love, one of the honored citizens of Jacksonville, was carried away by the fearful epidemic that scourged the town in 1869, joining her husband who had preceded her by only a few months. The intrepid mother, who did a deed as brave as any ever recorded in ancient song or story, became the wife of Aaron Chambers, and widowed a second time, continued to live in Jacksonville until her death.

Who that has not suffered can tell the withering thoughts that cling to the bitter memory of that dreadful October day and night? And who among us all can say that when the great harvest of the Eternal is garnered in there will not be one little golden sheaf that will fill the sad and sorrowing heart with gladness for ever and ever more.

Commercial Fishing is Poor at Mouth.

The exceptional warmth of the water in Rogue river this year is keeping the fish from entering the river at Gold Beach, according to Claud Bardon, the local fisherman, who has just returned from the mouth of the river. He also says there need be no fear of depletion of the fish in the river if the law is strictly enforced in the lower river, but that the difficulty is in enforcement, although a real attempt is being made. Many thousand of steel-heads are reported lying in the river at the mouth of cold streams, but refusing to come up Rogue river on account of the warmth. As soon as the stream cools one of the greatest runs of small steelheads and salmon ever experienced may be looked for according to the old timers on the river. Bardon has been at Gold Beach since June, returning by the trail and by West Fork.—Grants Pass Courier.
