A meeting of the Medford Chamber of Commerce will be held September 1st, at which time that organization will inaugurate a movement looking toward the removal of the county court house from Jacksonville to Medford, and in order to make it appear that the demand for said removal emanates from other sections of the county, Medford Machiavellis are making a strong effort to induce Mayor C. B. Lambkin of Ashland to open the campaign at next week's meeting. It is planned to place two measures on the ballot at the coming general election; one will provide for the removal of the county seat at a certain date and the second provides for a tax levy for the purpose of erecting a suitable court house at Medford. This, in abbreviated form, is the plan of operation the Medford Chamber of Commerce has mapped out—a plan which is foredoomed to failure. With the price of building material almost prohibitive and the wages of workmen sky high, it is extremely improbable that taxpayers will consider this a fitting time to erect a court house either at Medford or elsewhere. Again, the county's present bonded indebtedness is \$500,000, on which we pay 6 per cent interest annually. Property owners, of course, will be delighted to add a few hundred thousand dollars to this amount for the sole purpose of adding to our neighboring city's prestige. In seeking possession of the court house, Medford is actuated by no altruistic desire to benefit the taxpayers; Medford's guiding spirits want the court house because they think it would be a distinct acquisition to their city. As for the taxpayers—well, they can pay the bill.
