Plan To Move County Seat.

the removal of the county seat, his eloquent and forceful address winning repeated rounds of applause from his audience. Col. Sargent considered the matter from both a business and moral standpoint. Touching on the business side of the question he called attention to the fact that Jackson county had recently suffered severe financial losses in the collapse of the Bank of Jacksonville, which funds must be replaced; that taxpayers were already carrying as great a burden as they could bear, and that the present, with the price building material and the wages of skilled workmen both extremely high, was a most unfavorable time to erect a new court house. The present county jail which was erected in 1911 at a cost of about \$40,000 can not be duplicated today for thrice that amount. Col. Sargent also called attention to the fact that for years Medford has enjoyed the benefit of local trade. It is

the natural market place for our produce and local business men look to Medford wholesalers for a great part of their merchandise, therefore any move to cripple or diminish our resources is an indirect blow at Medford's business interests.

Dealing with the moral angle of his subject the Colonel reminded his hearers that grounds for an old grievance against Portland was the belief entertained by Medfordites that the Oregon metropolis was prone to benefit itself at the expense of Medford and other small cities of the state and the speaker pointed out that in seeking the removal of the county seat Medford was displaying precisely the same spirit it had criticised in Portland, clinching his argument by quoting the Golden Rule.

Colonel Sargent further maintained that instead of endeavoring to move the court house nearer Medford every effort should be made toward increasing population and extending Medford's city limits nearer the court house, and expressed the belief that it would be to the greatest common good if Medford would extend a friendly, even a helping hand to the smaller surrounding towns.

Considerable applause and laughter was aroused when the Colonel said: "The only reason I can see for the removal of the court house is because a few lawyers are inconvenienced. If they would walk over from Medford and back, they would be happier and live 10 years longer."
