Notes From County School Supt's. Office

The Jackson county club contests and the Educational Exhibits of the county schools are being held on Friday and Saturday this week at the Medford Natatorium.

Winners of the awards at the contests will send their exhibits to the state fair.

Most schools in the county are now open but three or four rural schools are yet without teachers.

Cannery Production Prohibited

The canning industry is suffering from boosting cost of labor and raw material beyond reason. Although Gray's Harbor and other fish-producing waters have big runs of salmon costs are too high to operate. Same is true of some fruit and vegetable districts.

When the cost of canned food product is more than can be obtained for it in the open competitive market production must cease.

The government is no longer buying canned products for war supplies at war prices, but cost of operation is still at war levels.

In some big fishing ports the employees of salmon canneries and fish by-products are idle as a result of this condition.

When it is considered that any food product competes with all other food products artificially boosted costs are fatal.

Present costs of production are prohibitive and there must be some reduction in expense of putting up pack to move the product.
