I fegret very much, if my suggestion of a monument at Jacksonville to commemorate its pioneer character and historic importance, in the event of a removal of the court house, has caused any offense. If any one feels aggrieved or hurt by it, it is because they misunderstand or misconstrued me

In the first place I will say that in the very nature of things there will have to be a new court house before many years. We all know that the one
