Bank of Jacksonville
Will Pay at Least
25 Cents on Dollar

State Superintendent of Banks W. H. Bennett this week filed with the county clerk a statement of the assets of the defunct Bank of Jacksonville. It is thought that the bank will be open to receive claims from creditors in the near future. Following are the figures as filed by Mr. Bennett who estimates that depositors will receive at least 25 cents on the dollar when settlement is made:

A dispatch from Salem says that the grand jury which convenes in October will be asked to make a thorough investigation of the bank failure as well as into the responsibility for the unusually large deposit of county funds carried with the bank at the time of the failure, according to G. M. Roberts, district attorney for Jackson county who was in Salem on legal business.

Roberts said he is working on a theory by which he hoped to save to the county its entire deposit with the defunct bank. This theory, Roberts explained involves the claim of all county funds on deposit in the bank in excess

of the legal allowance as a trust fund. Such a fund he said, would have preference over all other claims in the payment of depositors and it is believed that the assets of the bank will be about sufficient to cover the county's deposit.

School Elections.

At a well attended school election held in this city Monday afternoon Charles Numan was unanimously elected school director of district number one to succeed William Johnson. The people of Jacksonville are to be congratulated on securing Mr. Numan in this capacity as he is well known and liked, having lived here many years and will doubtless prove an alert, fair-minded official. At the same election the budget of expenditures for the ensuing school year was voted upon and carried.

The special election held Friday afternoon to determine whether the local high school be continued or whether the pupils attend the Medford high school, resulted in a vote of 43 to 5 in favor of reopening the Jacksonville school. The school board has recently received applications for positions from four high school teachers and the matter of securing teachers which was a factor in closing the school can now be satisfactorily arranged. About 18 pupils are attending Medford high and are taking special courses at that institution.

SUIT TO FORECLOSE MORTGAGE IN THE CIRCUIT COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON, IN AND FOR THE COUNTY OF JACKSON.

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF OREGON: You are hereby required to appear in the above entitled court and cause and answer the complaint of plaintiff therein filed within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, and if you fail to so appear and answer plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief prayed for in his said complaint, namely, for a judgment against the defendants Frank C. Kiser and Effa B. Kiser, his wife, and W. T. Grieve and each of them for \$1000.00 with interest thereon at 10% per annum from July 5, 1917, until paid, being the amount due upon the note of said defendants secured by the herein- after mentioned mortgage, and for the further sum of \$130.00 attorney's fees for the foreclosure of said mortgage with like interest thereon from date of decree; and for judgment against the defendants Frank C. Kiser and Effa B. Kiser, for the further sum of \$173.60 with 10% interest thereon from September 6, 1919, taxes paid by plaintiff on the mortgaged premises; and judgment against all defendants for the costs and disbursements of this suit.

Kiser to plaintiff of date July 5, 1911, and recorded in Volume 28 at pages 145-46 of the Mortgage Records for Jackson County, State of Oregon, and the note therein described so as to the name the payee in said note and the mortgagee in said mortgage as Jasten Hartman instead of as Jason Hartman and to foreclose said mortgage as reformed and decreeing the sale of the following described mortgaged premises and all interest that the defendants had therein on July 5, 1911, or have since acquired, and for the satisfaction of the aforesaid judgment, to-wit: Lots 1 and 2 and the South half of the Northeast quarter of Section 4, in Township 33, South of Range 4, West of the Willamette Meridian in Jackson County, State of Oregon; and for a decree forever foreclosing each and all of the above named defendants, and all persons claiming through them, from any and all right, title, estate, lien or interest in or to said premises, except the statutory right of redemption; and for judgment and execution against the defendants Frank C.
