Jackson County Wins Third Prize.

Although the Jackson county exhibit only won third place at the state fair in its section, County Agriculturist Agent C. C. Cate arrived home this morning from Salem with a bad cold but happy over the splendid showing made by this county's exhibit. While Jackson did not win first place in the estimation of the judges proved the most popular with many thousands who visited the fair.

Cate but solely to make a good showing for the Jackson county crops. Had the industries of the county only aided with displays we might have stood a good chance for first place. As it was we scored 83 out of 100 points and through the lack of an industry display such as lumber, canning, brooms and other home made products failed to score higher.

In awarding prizes the state was divided into sections known as the Willamette valley, Coast, Blue Mountain and central Oregon section. Jackson and the other southern Oregon counties were classed in the Willamette valley section. Benton county was awarded first place in this section

Lane county second place and Jackson county third place. Mr. Cate has much praise for the display of Lane county.

Price Reductions.

PORTLAND ORE, Oct. 2.—Declines in wholesale prices of food commodities in Portland from the highest point reached varying from 50% for small white beans, 42% for rice and 35 for sugar to two% for some brands of breakfast foods, are shown in a compilation today by the Portland Telegram from wholesalers price lists.

Beans dropped from \$13 to \$6.50 a hundred, rice from \$13 to \$7.50. Other declines noted were flour from \$14 to \$12.75 a barrel; condensed milk from \$7.25 to \$6 a case.
