What Some Officials Have Done

If a man enters into a contract and violates it would you sign another agreement with him? If a candidate for office fails to keep his pledges, will you vote for him again?

For the past ten years or more our representatives in the legislature have centralized their efforts, at least their promises, on three issues:

- (1) Better roads—that is a fair distribution of the state funds for Jackson county.
(2) The reestablishment of the Normal School at Ashland.
(3) The protection of the fish of Rogue River.

The legislature authorized and issued \$28,600,000 of bonds for road building, with the distinct understanding and promise that the Pacific highway should be completely paved from Portland to California out of this fund before other roads were constructed. Less than one-third of this most important highway has been paved, while this immense sum has practically all been spent and squandered. Hundreds of miles of road have been paved in the northern end of the state, principally around Portland, while the only tourist route through the state, the great thoroughfare leading from British Columbia to Mexico, remains a streak of mud and impassable during a large part of the year. Think of it! Nearly twenty nine million dollars spent, and other bonds will have to be issued to complete the Pacific highway, and the bonds of our great state now selling for eighty nine cents on the dollar!

Why did the representatives of Jackson County and southern Oregon permit practically all of this vast road fund to be diverted to the north end of the state?

Oregon still has only one normal school, located in the extreme northwestern part of the state. It accommodates only a limited number of pupils and therefore graduates few teachers. We have to import a majority of normal trained instructors from other states, while the fine state normal building at Ashland still accumulates moss and is the abode of bats and owls, despite the profuse promises of our legislators to reestablish the school there. Should they be reelected on this record?

And did some one say fish—or was it suckers? The Rogue River fish controversy continues to revolve like a dead salmon in a whirlpool, periodically thrusting its unsavory odor under the people's noses. At each session of the legislature our representatives have introduced a bill of some sort in a pretended effort to protect the fishing in this most fascinating stream, but every measure has tightened the grip of the salmon packers.
