NEW MOVE IN BANK CASES.

A surprize was sprung in the circuit court Wednesday March 23, when the district attorney, with whom was associated Mr. L. A. Liljenquist of the attorney general's office, took up the cases of State vs. Blakeley, covering alleged false report to the superintendent of banks; State vs. Hines, for receiving deposits when the Bank of Jacksonville was insolvent, and State vs. Kubli for aiding and abetting a cashier of a bank to misapply the bank's funds, and presented a motion that demurrers filed some months ago to these indictments be reconsidered and sustained, and that the indictments be resubmitted to the May grand jury.

During the motion, the district attorney explained that he and Mr. Liljenquist, after a thorough investigation, had some question as to the sufficiency of the indictments as to form, and preferred an opportunity to have the indictments resubmitted by the grand jury in such form as to prevent any question of their being knocked out during the trial or in the supreme court. The motions were all granted by the court. It was stated at the time that similar action would be taken on the two actions against Hines which had been transferred to Josephine county, but the motion will have to be made in that county where the cases are now pending. However, it will be requested that the cases be returned to Jackson county for resubmission to the Jackson county grand jury.

At the same time, a motion was made for a continuance of the case against Mrs. Blakeley, charging her malfeasance in office to the May term of court. This case which was tried recently and resulted in a disagreement of the jury, which was reported to have stood nine to three for conviction.

At the same time, the district attorney took up the case of State vs. J. E. Bartlett, and State vs. S. L. Johnston, both charged with aiding a cashier to misapply the funds of the bank, and moved that the indictments in both cases be dismissed, on the ground that after a very thorough investigation by the district attorney's office and Mr. Liljenquist, it was found that the state had not sufficient evidence to show that these men were guilty of a crime in their dealings with the Bank of Jacksonville. It was expressly pointed out, that the motion had nothing to do with the amounts owed the bank by these men, but was on the ground that the state had no evidence of a criminal intent in the obtaining of the money. A similar motion was made about a week ago in the case of the state vs. Quigley for the same reasons. This action cleaned the present docket of all criminal cases concerning the Bank of Jacksonville, except that of W. H. Johnson, cashier of the bank, which is the last case on the docket.

Mr. Liljenquist arrived in Medford Saturday from Salem to participate in these cases and he and the district attorney acquiesced fully in the action which was taken with regard to all the cases taken up before the court on Wednesday.

With the exception of the Bartlett, Quigley and Johnston cases, none of these cases were dismissed as reported by a Jackson county paper Wednesday afternoon, but were simply resubmitted to the grand jury at its May session in order that corrected indictments might be found. And the case against Mrs. Blakeley for malfeasance in office was merely continued to the May term of court in order that all the bank cases remaining for trial might be consolidated in a single docket.

Mr. Liljenquist is a special assistant in the attorney general's office and is a lawyer of unusual ability, and widely considered one of the leading attorneys in the State of Oregon. He will continue to have a part in the criminal cases arising from the bank's failure. When the matter of retaining Mr. Liljenquist in the bank cases was presented to the county court of Jackson county, they expressed a willingness to do everything possible to see that nothing was left undone on all matters affecting the bank failure, and agreed to stand the expense of Mr. Liljenquist's participation in the cases. Such action on the part of the county court was recommended by the district attorney.

It was also stated by the District Attorney that the authorities have accurate data concerning the bank's affairs and that the Bank department is in possession of information concerning practically all the banks assets, and Mr. Bramwell has asserted his intention of leaving nothing undone to recover these assets as far as possible. Also, the District Attorney's office is in possession of complete data concerning the inside affairs of the bank which, however, has not been made public on account of the civil and criminal cases now pending. He also stated that nothing was being withheld except data concerning the cases yet to be tried.
