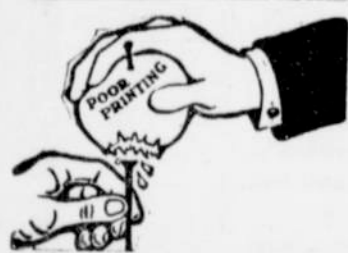

CONGRESS SUMMONED IN SPECIAL SESSION

Tariff and Tax Revision to Be
Principal Subjects Before
the New Congress.

Washington.—A proclamation con-
vening congress in special session at
noon, April 11, "to receive such com-
munication as may be made by the
executive," was issued Tuesday by
President Harding.

Tariff and tax revision will be the
principal subject before the new con-
gress, but many other important sub-
jects, including the transportation
problem, regulation of the packing and
coal industries and immigration re-
striction are expected to be taken up.

None of the subjects to be consid-
ered was mentioned in the call for the
session. The Fordney emergency tariff
bill, as vetoed by former President
Wilson, will be rushed through con-
gress in the extra session.

According to the request of Presi-
dent Harding for passage of a mea-
sure designed to help farmers, afford-
ing protection against foreign com-
petition, republican members of the
house ways and means committee turned
about and voted to revive the Ford-
ney bill after agreeing a week ago not
to consider any emergency legisla-
tion ahead of a permanent tariff and
revenue revision.

Senators Penrose, Smoot and Mc-
Cumber of the senate finance com-
mittee agreed to the new program
which, it was explained, meets ap-
proval of the president.

The new Fordney bill will be pre-
sented with a six months' limitation,
but its provisions will expire earlier
should the permanent bill be enacted.

After disposing of the emergency
measure in the first few days of the
extra session, the house will take up
and pass the anti-dumping bill, which
will be followed by the allied mea-
sure fixing American valuation on
goods paying ad valorem.

Then will come the permanent
tariff, which republican leaders hope
will be broad enough to satisfy all
interests demanding an upward re-
vision.

\$5 POLL TAX IS APPROVED

Every Person, 21 to 50, in Washington,
Subject to Levy.

Olympia, Wash.—Governor Hart has
signed the poll tax bill passed by the
last legislature. The bill became ef-
fective at once and under it every man
and woman in the state between the
ages of 21 and 50 years must pay a
poll tax of \$5 before May 1 of each
year. The first year's tax is due be-
fore May 1 next.

Governor Hart has filed with the se-
cretary of state his veto of items to-
talling \$64,450, the omnibus appropria-
tions bill of the last legislature.

The veto brings the total appropria-
tions invalidated by the governor to
\$1,062,066.02. The stricken items
leave the general fund appropriations
of the last legislature at \$10,637,289.88
for the coming biennium, which in-
cludes \$1,430,893.95 to cover deficien-
cies from the past biennium.

Unconscious Cerebration.

Appropos of the popular interest in
the ouija board, a correspondent says:
"An experiment in unconscious cere-
bration may be made in this way.
Take a 5-cent piece and to it attach a
fine silk thread with a bit of sealing
wax. Then take an empty tumbler and
suspend the nickel in the center of the
glass, holding the thread tightly be-
tween the thumb and finger and rest-
ing the elbow on the 'funny bone'.
Then, without conscious volition of the

muscles, think of its movement east,
west, north or south, or returning to
the center. You will find that the coin
will obey the thought, although you
give consciously no direction for the
movement."—From the Outlook.

and yellow-green, blue-green, sky-
blue, blue and blue-violet and violet.
The Indians did not have names for
all the subdivisions of color. Their
name for blue is ochako; for green,
okhamall; red is called humma, and
yellow, lakna. These are names in
the Choctaw tongue.

Quaint Industries.

Observation of the world's indus-
tries reveals some very quaint callings,
for there are queer habits and strange
desires on the part of various races,
and always there are those who cater
to those customs or undertake to sup-
ply the wants. As queer a trade or
profession as any is that of "tooth-
stainer," which flourishes in parts of
Asia, where the natives regard black
teeth as a crowning beauty. The tooth-
stainer, equipped with little brushes
and boxes of coloring matter, calls on
his customers at regular intervals. In
general, the operation is not unlike
that of blacking a shoe.

Michigan Leads All.

Michigan has the largest farm bu-
reau county in the United States. It
is Sanilac, where incomplete tabu-
lation of the membership campaign re-
sults showed 2,900 members, with the
final tally estimated at close to 3,400.
Ironquins county, Illinois, was the next
largest with 2,896 members. Saginaw
county is likely to become the second
largest county in the country. It now
has 2,650 farm bureau members, and
expects soon to have more than 3,000.
Membership of the Michigan state
farm bureau now is 53,051, and it is
growing at the rate of about 1,500
weekly. The southern half of the lower
peninsula now is canvassed and the
campaign is extending into the north-
western part of the state.

Musical Street Criers.

In Charleston, even the chimney
sweeps are musical, and as their tiny
faces appear at the top of the chim-
ney they are sweeping, you hear:
"Roo-roo" sung out over the sounds
of the street below. Also to this tribe
the charcoal boy belongs. He drives

load are black, the donkey is black,
the boy is black and the only other
color that you can see in the whole
oufit is the whites of the boy's eyes
as he rolls them around and calls the
certain, long-drawn-out "Char-coal!"
You wonder which is the sadder and
blackest, the driver, the driven, cart
or contents, as they wend their soli-
tary way onward, crying ever that sad,
minor wail of charcoal!—Charleston
News and Courier.

Japs Eating Frog Meat.

Frog meat made its first appearance
last month in the menu of one of the
most popular restaurants of Tokyo,
Japan. Frogs had never been consid-
ered as a food until very recently by
the Japanese.

In 1918 Dr. Watanabe brought some
edible frogs from the United States.
They were kept at the infectious dis-
ease experimental station, where ex-
periments were made in breeding and
raising.

The government has taken steps to
encourage the raising and eating of
frogs.

World's Smallest Newspaper.
The smallest newspaper in the
world is now being printed in New
York city. Its pages are only about
five inches wide and six inches long,
but they contain short news items that
are very easily and quickly read. An-
other odd newspaper published in this
same city is called The Deaf Mutes'
Journal, all of its editors and general
staff being members of a deaf and
dumb school. However, The Deaf
Mutes' Journal is a real newspaper in
size and contains four pages of in-
teresting reading.
