OLD WOOL SCHEDULE IN NEW TARIFF BILL

Washington.—The old Payne-Aldrich tariff duty on grease wool, 11 cents a pound, has been agreed upon by the house subcommittee framing the permanent tariff measure to be introduced at the extra session. Members said the wool schedule probably would be adopted by the full committee without material change. Taking grease wool as the basis, the rate on washed wool would be 22 cents and on scoured 33 cents. In the emergency tariff the grease wool duty is 15 cents. By accepting these figures the committee virtually revives schedule K, long fought over in congress.

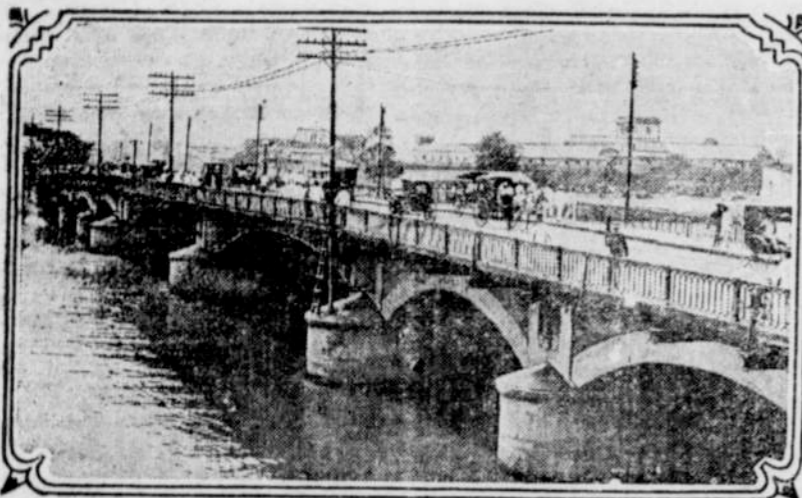
WOMEN MOVE TO DISARM

Easter Mass Meeting Asks Conference With Nations of the World.

Washington.—A resolution requesting President Harding "to call a conference of the nations on world disarmament" and asking that increased appropriations of congress for armaments be postponed pending such a conference, was adopted at an Easter mass meeting held under auspices of the women's disarmament committee.

Senator Borah of Idaho again advocated an agreement between the United States, Great Britain and Japan to reduce naval armament and charged authors of the program for increased armaments with being "sedulous patrons of bolshevism, painstaking and industrious gardeners of unrest and misery."

A Passing Landmark of Old Manila



This is a photograph of the famous old Bridge of Spain, Manila. It is now a departed landmark of the Philippines, for its place has been taken by one of the finest bridges in the entire Orient, the new Jones bridge.

The Jones Bridge is named in honor of the late Congressman W. A. Jones of Virginia, author of the Jones law of 1916 which promised the Philippines independence upon the establishment of a stable government.

The old Bridge of Spain is called "the mother of Manila's bridges." The original bridge was built of pontoons sometime between the years 1500 and 1600, being known as the Bridge of Boats. The stone bridge shown above was built about 1630. It was twice damaged by earthquakes, and was once partly demolished by a flood.

ASKS INDEPENDENCE WITH OR WITHOUT PROTECTION

Manila, P. I.—The people of the Philippines want independence in whatever form they can get it. Manuel Quezon, president of the Philippine senate, declared in an address before that body.



"Let the Americans in the Philippines and those in the United States know that the people of the Philippines covet their freedom, liberty and political emancipation so much that they will not hesitate to receive from the Congress of the United States complete and absolute independence without protection," Quezon said.

"If the United States, dictated by its own interests, decides to extend protection to the Philippines, well and good. We would accept that as a solution of our problems. If not, let us have absolute independence in whatever form we can get it."

President Quezon declared that if the question were put before the Filipinos for a vote, 88 per cent would favor absolute independence.

A TEST OF FAITH

(Chattanooga News.)

We have frequent occasion to protest against the efforts of Japan to impose her dominion upon unwilling peoples, yet we have thus far failed to exemplify the ideals which we recommend to Japan. If we should withdraw our sovereignty from the Philippines, in accordance with our repeated promises, we could the more consistently ask Japan to follow a similar course toward Shantung, Manchuria and Siberia. Our plea would have a great deal more force if we could make it with clean hands. To say that the Philippines are not ready for independence is merely to express an arbitrary, gratuitous opinion. It is perfectly easy to create conditions—in one's own mind—that no people ever could comply with. Our delay about respecting our own pledge is a reflection on our national good faith and a constant invitation to international complications in the far east.

INDEPENDENCE OF PHILIPPINES

The Philippines should be given absolute independence, which is their natural right, even if we are well aware that they have not yet reached the full stature of Americanism. We ourselves have not reached it so long as we insist upon governing other peoples against their will.

CAPITOL CALLS LIMITED

President to See Casual Visitors on Three Days of Week.

Washington, D. C.—Office seekers, inventors of reform panaceas, and even members of congress and others who want to ask favors or dispense advice at the White House must make their calls on Monday, Wednesday or Friday hereafter, if they hope to see President Harding.

This announcement was made in accord with a decision by the president that he was giving too much time to visitors who have thronged the executive offices ever since inauguration. The demand on his time has been so great that he has spent many night hours at work on correspondence and other pressing business.

Colors Save the Eggs.
We have heard a great deal about protective coloration in nature, and when we consider the advantages which accrue to protectively colored eggs we may wonder why some eggs have remained pure white through the ages, why others are of the most conspicuous greenish blue, and why still others stand out by their spotted or speckled patterns, says the American Forestry Magazine. White eggs are for the most part laid by hole-nesting species of birds like the owls and woodpeckers, and since the eggs are well hidden in their dark cavities it has not been necessary for them to develop protective coloration. The bright greenish blue eggs of most of the thrushes, for example, must be hidden in nests which are concealed in dense vegetation and the speckled eggs of the ground nesting sparrows depend for their safety upon the good hiding of the grass-woven nest.

The Christmas Season.
Though Christmas seems to gain rather than lose in popular favor as the years roll by, yet it is worthy of note that the Christmas season has been much curtailed from what it originally was. For several centuries it began with the eve of All Saints day or "Hallow eve," October 31, and continued until Candlemas day, February 2. In England it is now computed only from Christmas eve to "Twelfth night," January 6, while in our own country it begins on Christmas eve and practically ends on Christmas night. Yet even now it really begins on December 16 marked in the church calendar "O Sapientia," from the name of an anthem sung during Advent.

Little Known of Frogs.
Along the rivers and streams in some parts of Texas, and around the margins of ponds and lakes, we meet with great beds of the water hyacinths, says the American Forestry Magazine. Their delicate white flowers and dark green leaves present a picture of floral luxuriance not very easily forgotten. Where they grow one should be on the lookout for various species of reptiles or batrachians, and their habits and appearances in nature carefully observed. We know very little about some of the forms, and science will welcome any new facts in regard to them. Some of the frogs and toads, for example, are not only very rare in collections, but we are practically lacking in any field notes upon their exact distribution and habits.

Modern Cereals Superior.
The wheat and barley of today are much larger and finer grains than the wheat and barley which have been found in ancient Egyptian tombs and in the buried cities of Greece. As for rice, which feeds more than one-third of the human race, there are now a number of varieties (developed chiefly by the Japanese) which are far superior to any that were known even half a century ago.

All of our grains, excepting maize seem to have originated in southern Asia. Consumption of rice, the great Asiatic cereal, is now growing rapidly in the United States, most of our people having learned only recently to appreciate it, and how to prepare it for the table.
