State News in Brief

ALBANY—That a big female wolf gnawed a 6-inch log in two in an effort to escape when caught in a trap was the report made by A. G. Ames, government trapper now working in the Santiam national forest, when he returned to his headquarters at Cascadia a few days ago after a trapping excursion up Canyon creek.

SALEM—The first cherries of the season were received by local canneries Monday. These were rather green, it was said. The big run will begin next week. Four cents a pound is being paid thus far for this year's crop, which promises to be a bumper one and of excellent quality. Loganberries are coming in rapidly, and strawberries are still being handled by local canneries. One cannery here is said to be turning out loganberries and strawberries at the rate of 100 cans a minute.

SALEM—The proposed excursion of governors to Alaska in July has been canceled, according to a telegram received by Governor Olcott from Miles C. Riley, of Madison, Wisconsin, secretary of the governor's conference. The reason given was that not enough governors have agreed to go on the trip.

SALEM—An attorney residing in another state cannot legally perfect an appeal of an action to the Oregon supreme court, unless the lawyer is a member of the Oregon bar, according to an opinion handed down here this week by the supreme court.

The question came before the supreme court from Portland in the form of an appeal case handled by a Washington attorney. When it was found that the lawyer was not a member of the Oregon bar, further hearing of the case was halted.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene—A copy of the centennial number of the Manchester Guardian of Manchester, England, has been received by the school of journalism. The paper was first issued on May 2, 1821, and in celebration of its 100th anniversary the publishers put out a 92 page edition with a facsimile of the first issue as a supplement.

The entire front page is covered with advertisements, as is still the custom with British newspapers. Among the items listed is one which announces a treatise on a new system of vegetable cookery. A lottery is advertised in one of the items.

A news dispatch from Odessa, under the date line of March 26, 1821, said a strong American squadron had appeared in Turkish waters and captured five Turkish ships, two of which were frigates. The reason assigned for these hostilities is the non-recognition of the American ambassador. The Brazil dispatch said that the spirit of revolution was growing very rapidly among the South American countries, most of which were then Spanish colonies.

Among the literary features of the sheet is a current poem by Thomas Moore. There are 12 notices of bankrupts run in a column much like the modern column of vital statistics.

GRANTS PASS—The tourists season at the Josephine caves has commenced and every day numerous parties from all parts of the country go through the caverns. The government has started work on the new highway to the caves and it is expected that this work will be completed this year instead of taking two years as previously intended.

The county is improving the road leading to the forest reserve and it will soon be in excellent condition. The trip from the end of the wagon road to the caves, a distance of about five miles, must still be made on foot or with pack horses. The trip through the caves takes about four hours. R. W. SALEM—Upon transfer of the ownership by sale or otherwise of motor vehicles the person in whose name the motor vehicle is regulated and licensed and the person to whom ownership or possession passes are required by the state law to join in a notice of such transfer to the secretary of state, according to Attorney General Van Winkle. In case of a transfer through foreclosure of mortgage and the consent of the mortgagor cannot be obtained, the attorney general holds, the secretary of state may accept a certified copy of the court proceedings by which such transfer was effected as evidence in place of the written consent of the person transferring ownership.
