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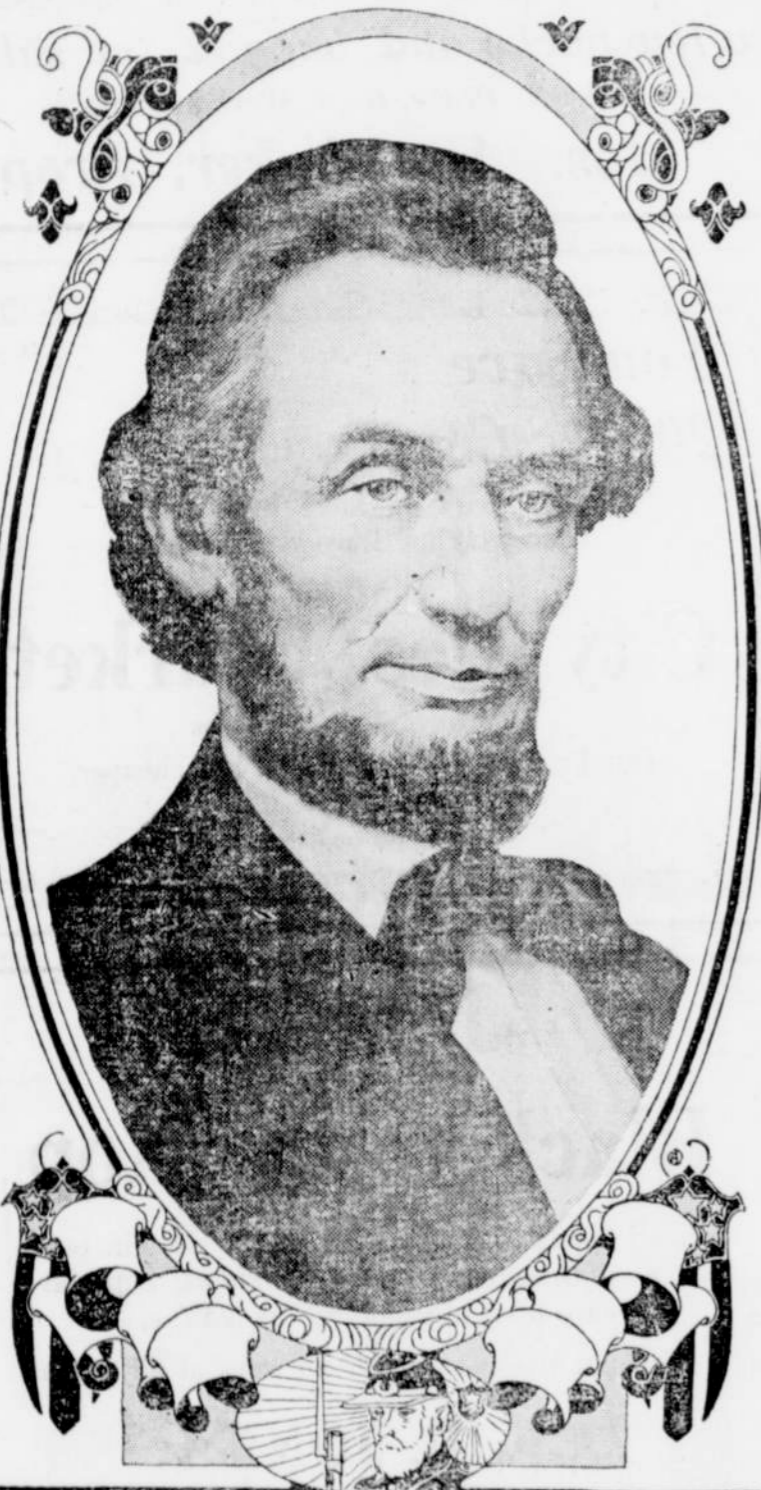

HOW TO KEEP FIT— FORGET YOUR DIET

Get Your Digester Fixed So That
It Will Digest

Most of the things that we know about diets are not so. Diets are going out of fashion. They used to be quite the thing. There is only one glaring exception to this generality, and that is in the case of those unfortunate women who are making frantic efforts to reduce. Of course, there are still diets for certain diseases and in acute illness, but in a general way it is fair to say that for the average person and for the ordinary so-called chronic case the best authorities are now admitting that diets, as they used to be considered, are not the scientific method of treatment.

Either you have a capable stomach or you haven't. If you have, go to it, and eat what you like of any sane food at proper intervals and in proper amounts, and you will be happy. If this is not the case, stop trying to tinker with your digestive machine yourself, but take it to an osteopath, have him examine it thoroughly, and find out why it doesn't work well, and fix it if he can.

An automobile or a boat will not go well if it is twisted or dented or if it has a bad list. Neither will a human stomach. It is silly to dump pepsin pills or charcoal into a stomach, which is suspended in a faulty position as the result of a twist or a dent or list in the body which holds it. Osteopathic physicians do not ignore the chemical problems of digestion or the intricacies of diet, but they do examine your body as a whole, as well as your stomach, and analyze the relations between the two in a common sense attempt to establish a proper co-ordination. CELEBRATE AT ASHLAND.

On next Monday the great Jackson County Parade and Celebration will take place at Ashland. It looks as though everybody who can ride or walk will be there, either as spectators or participants in the events. The committees are getting everything ready for the big crowds.

It will be wise for as many as possible to bring their dinners with them, as the restaurants and lunch rooms will be rushed to capacity. The stunts in the parade will alone be well worth seeing. Many will compete and take part in this feature that will make everybody laugh.

The Committee has put the admission charge to the big wrestling match between Thye and Hand at a dollar to all parts of the house, except a few seats at the ringside. This is about half the price usually asked for standard wrestling matches such as this will be. The Mayors of each City and Town in the County and their families will be given complimentary tickets for ringside seats.

The ballgame at the High school grounds in the afternoon will follow the wrestling match, and will give the crowd a fine chance to root for their favorites. The Elks teams from Medford and Ashland are so evenly matched that the game promises to be closely contested up to the last man out.

The stunts to be performed by Pangborn and Clark in the flying machine while the ball game is in process will supply all the thrills that are good for you. These two aviators are so daring in their performances that their reputations extend all up and down the coast and well over into States further east.

Of course the fireworks display at night will furnish the spectacular features of the occasion. It will be a display such as few people have seen surpassed. The Ritt Fireworks Co., which will handle this part of the celebration, say they have some mighty big surprises in store, and thousands will say "oh, isn't that magnificent!" when things begin to go off.

Patriotic speeches of ten minutes each will be delivered by a number of well-known Jackson County orators in Lithia Park while the wrestling match is on. This will entertain those who are not interested in sporting contests.

Altogether the Jackson County folks are going to show the rest of the State what they are capable of doing when they really get going. Mrs. Chas. Loomis and other ladies toured the country Saturday lining up the different communities and getting things sharpened up for the parade.
