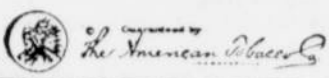

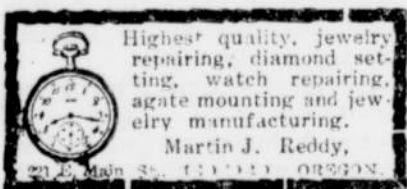
Mr. and Mrs. John Lawrence and Miss Alice Hanley of Medford were guests of the local Eastern Star chapter Wednesday night.

School Fight Still Rages

But little progress toward clearing to local school tangle was made at a meeting held at the court house this morning for the purpose of endeavoring to find some way out of the difficulty. Both factions were represented by council, Attorney A. E. Reames appearing for Directors Flemming and Smith, and Attorney Gus Newbury for Professor Stultz and other interested parties. The matter of dispute was argued, pro and con, with no tangible result, and it now looks as though the disagreement will be matter for court procedure, suits, injunctions and what-not.

The situation is deplorable in that no matter what the outcome may be the ill feeling already engendered cannot but affect the welfare of the school for months to come.

Following is a list of teachers who have signed contracts, legal or illegal, with District No. 1: Principal, E. G. Stultz, \$2200 per year, it is reported that Professor Stultz has expressed himself as willing to accept the position at a salary of \$2000. Principal Ben W. Hasmer, \$1,575 per year; Assistant Principal, Mrs. Mabel Yeager, \$125 per month; 7th and 8th grades, R. R. Finch, \$150 per month; 7th and 8th grades, Miss Vida Bradshaw, \$110 per month; 5th and 6th grades, Mrs. Bert Armbrist, \$120 per month; 3rd and 4th grades, Miss Hazel Wiley, \$110 per month; 1st and 2nd grades, Miss Nellie Hake, \$110 per month.

The question, in a nutshell, is which of the two principals shall have charge of the school and which of two shall teach the 7th and 8th grades.
