EASTERN GROWERS PLAN TO BEAT WESTERN FRUIT.

Coast Pruning, Spraying and Pack Methods to be Followed to Recapture Local Market.

Mid-west and eastern orchardists are planning to follow the pacific coast practices in growing and marketing their fruits in an attempt to recapture their own home markets now largely held by the far-west trade. They are telling themselves that if they prune to get better size and color in their fruit, spray to keep down insects and diseases, pick the fruit to keep it free of bruises, and then put it up in attractive box packs which are held in cold storage "with enough moisture to prevent shriveling," they can out the western product because of the advantage they have in transportation charges. This does not mean that the coast growers are bound to lose the markets, thinks W. S. Brown, chief of horticulture at O. A. C. Experiment station. Superior climate conditions make for a certainty of crop much above that of the eastern conditions, and also lend a high color and fine quality that are truly distinctive. The industry is a business in itself here, while in the more eastern districts it is only a side-line that will not get the study and attention it receives here.

Western men have a big advantage in the cost of containers, Professor Brown points out. Nearness to box lumber mills enable the western grower to buy good boxes at 12 to 16 cents, whereas the eastern growers paid as high as \$1.50 per barrel of three bushels capacity last year.

With a further reduction in freight rates by rail to eastern points, and increasing shipments through the canal to European markets the pacific coast growers may expect to find outlets for their surplus high grade fruits. No other kind should be sent.

BATTLESHIP TO BE SAVED.

PORTLAND, Or.—In reply to a protest filed by Representative Johnson of Washington against the destruction of the old battleship Oregon, Secretary of the Navy Denby wrote the following letter:

"I have to inform you that it is not the present intention of the navy department to destroy the Oregon; on the contrary, it is planned, if practicable, to preserve the vessel as an historical naval relic; and an effort is being made to complete arrangements with the State of Oregon whereby that state can become the custodian of the vessel and permanently lay her up at some suitable port where she will be accessible to visitors and serve as a stimulus of patriotism to this and future generations."

FARM POINTERS THAT POINT.

Grain seeded late will not germinate so well nor stool so freely as that seeded early. From 10 to 25 per cent more seed, therefore, should be used in late seeding.—O. A. C. experiment station.

Apple growers who have not yet sprayed for anthracnose canker protection should do so at once, using Bordeaux 4-4-50. All bark surface from topmost twig to the base of the trunk must be thoroughly covered. The spray protects the remaining fruit against the rot due to the same disease. Instructions for the preparation of Bordeaux mixture may be secured from the Oregon Experiment station at Corvallis free on request.—Department of botany and plant pathology.

Now is the time to hill select potatoes for seed. Choose only healthy, vigorous plants that are not next to a diseased hill. Vines meeting these requirements may be staked, when not frozen down already. Only high yielding hills should be retained at digging time.—O. A. C. Experiment station.

ABOUT STOCK MARKETS.

Stock tickers are now installed on European steamers and wireless telegraphy sends the ups and downs of Wall Street, so you can walk the deck and still make a million, or go broke, as the case may be—most likely the latter. We took a flier on Wall Street stocks once, and since then have let them severely alone, on the theory that the baby shies off from a hot stove upon which it once laid a trusting hand. Present indications point to the street taking a lively interest in things all over the country, as indeed it always does, putting up campaign funds for various "horses," and obtaining financial concessions from the government later in payment. Our government is borrowing money in large lots right now, and paying Wall Street manipulators large commissions on it, instead of issuing its own bonds without any commissions. We don't savvy the market talk any too well, but it sounds something like this: Upon reports that the steel trust would not support the harvester trust at the next Congressional election, the beef trust got mad and threatened to swear off smoking, to get even with the tobacco trust. Smoked meat immediately went up seven points. Then all the oil trusts flocked in, prices cheered for 37 minutes and pandemonium reigned, turning to hail.

Next the railroad trust threw a monkey wrench into the Ford steering gear by threatening to start a third party, and maybe a fourth and fifth. This rattled the railroad trust so that it started to raise rates, but the coal trust beat them to it. Prices showed a tired look, with dark circles under the eyes, and for the next hour everybody tried to make money regardless of whether the world was safe for democracy or Democrats or not. The banking trust has a grouch, because while it has several members in the cabinet the other trusts have two to their one in the Senate. Thereupon they trotted out the bank statement of the country and pointed out that it looks a little spavined in is off hind fetlock. The market closed strong, with everybody convinced that the rich must be protected, and the poor, dogtag their hides, can rustle, as usual.

SALEM, Ore.—The Standard Oil company Monday remitted to the secretary of state a check of \$65,128.81, covering the tax on the company's sales of gasoline and distillate in Oregon for September.

Another check from the Shell company of California, covering a similar tax, was for \$51,296.62.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The administration's peace treaties with Germany, Austria and Hungary were ratified by the senate Tuesday, the vote on the first two being 66 to 29, or eight more than the necessary two-thirds and the case of the Hungarian treaty, due to the absence of three senators, 66 to 17.

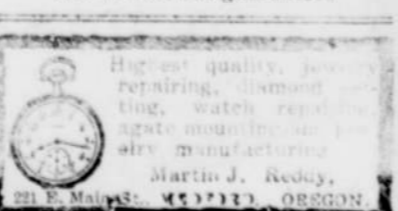
