**JACKSONVILLE SCHOOL**

(By Prof. Sawyer).

The incoming editor and publisher of the Post has asked me to present the school side of the town's life in connection with the initial issue of the paper under the new management. No institution in the community so largely and vitally touches the homes of the people and I know that underlying all local matters of controversy, must be a real loyalty for and interest in their school by all right thinking members of the community.

I shall undertake at this time only to present a few statistics and items of current interest. Aside from the conventional scholastic program of the smaller high school, conforming to college entrance requirements, the work of a commercial course is carried on as far as possible, embracing two years of book keeping and typing and one of short hand. Such work seems to be the most practical way in which a small school may give expansion to the universal demand for strictly "bread and butter" subjects, as a part of the curriculum.

Beside the writer, the high school work, 25 to 30 students, is in the hands of Mrs. Mabel Yeager and Miss Leila Mattern. The eight grades, occupying four rooms and numbering over 100, are under the instruction of the following: 1st and 2nd grades, Miss Nellie Hake; 3rd and 4th, Miss Hazel Wiley; 5th and 6th, Mrs. Nettie Armstrong; 7th and 8th, Mr. B. R. Finch.

The school is operating in the belief that its primary reason for existence is the development of the mental faculties of its students. First, by the school class-room activity and its accompanying work at home; second, by athletics; third by social contact; fourth, by student government and general conduct of school affairs under adequate supervision. Credits towards graduation shall represent honest achievement in the first mentioned of these phases of school life.

May I urge the people of the town to continue their support of the school as in years back? It is unfair to the students to deny them this cooperation because of an outside diversion for which they are not responsible.

For example, Jacksonville H. S., as a member of the Jackson County Conference will play six games of basketball on a regular schedule throughout December, January and February—three at home and one each at Talent, Phoenix and Applegate. The winner of this series will play the winner from a similar group in the southern part of the county. The team is out and practicing hard and faithfully. They deserve to know that the town is with them. On Oct. 22 a practice game is to be played with the town team to raise money for suits and shoes.

On the following Saturday night the combined grades and high school hope to have a good old "get-together" Halloween party with lots of songs and games and good cheer. It is the opportunity for all friends and parents of the children to turn out, enjoy what they have planned for your entertainment and fatten their depleted treasury by patronizing those with good things to sell.
