GREETING.

As announced last week by the retiring editor, T. W. Fulton, the Jacksonville Post has changed hands, the new owners being S. P. Shutt and son Harold, who followed the newspaper business in this state for a number of years, principally in Eastern Oregon.

In selecting Jacksonville as our home and place of business, it was with the firm belief that no better or more healthful climate can be found "outdoors," and that no portion of the entire western country has a brighter future and possibilities from a business standpoint than Rogue River Valley—especially the section tributary to Jacksonville.

It is the intention of the new owners to make every effort to improve the paper in every way possible, and with that end in view we have ordered a great deal of new type and other printing material, which will arrive within the next few days.

It is not our intention to try to compete with the large town newspapers, with their expensive equipment for turning out large quantities of reading matter, but we will endeavor to make the Post as neat, bright and spicy a newspaper as is usually found in country towns several times the size of Jacksonville. It is not always the paper having the most reading matter that is the most interesting or influential—not by a long shot. After all, it is quality and not quantity that counts with a newspaper. Half a dozen columns of live local news is of more interest and benefit to a community than many times that much reading matter—the boiler-plate dope usually found in country papers—that is of no local interest whatever.

The Post will continue to be independent in politics and will aim to treat all parties fairly, in the belief that every citizen is honestly entitled to his or her opinion in politics as well as religion and other such matters.

It will be the aim of the Post to work unceasingly for the advancement and best interests of Jacksonville and Jackson county, and we hope to be able to merit the newspaper business of not only Jacksonville but a just share of it from the entire county as well.

Beginning next week the Post will be published Fridays hereafter—a change which will prove more convenient for the publishers as well as our army of readers.
