## Site for Auto Park Selected

The committee appointed to select an auto park for Jacksonville, at the regular weekly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Monday evening, reported that the most suitable place in or near the town is the vacant ground at the rear of the old U. S. hotel. By vote of the club it was decided to accept this as the most suitable park obtainable, and the work of putting it in proper condition will be done as soon as possible.

While the park is not as large as those of some towns, it is large enough to accommodate a dozen cars and it is not probable that more than this number will be here at any one time to occupy it. It is in the center of town and surrounded by beautiful shade trees, with a good well of water and other conveniences, and a more suitable site for such a park could not be found in this vicinity. Tables, etc., will also be prepared for the accommodation of tourists.

A committee was appointed to have several suitable signs painted and put up at the junction of main roads leading from the paved state highway to Jacksonville—to attract tourists to this place for free camping grounds.

In this issue is a notice by the auto camp committee, urging all those men interested in the welfare of the town to meet at the park next Tuesday evening, 17th, to help clean up the grounds. There are a couple of old rotten sheds to tear down, several trees to trim and quite a bit of work to do in leveling up the ground.

Several of the enterprising women residing nearest the park—Mesdames Zell, Wilson, Finney and McCabe—beat the men to it and have already done much good work in cleaning up the place—for which they have the thanks of the town.

A committee was also appointed to investigate old rotten and useless shacks, fences, etc., that not only destroy the appearance of the town but which are a menace in case of fire. These are to be reported to the town council with a view of having them condemned and declared a nuisance, and if the owners do not tear them down the authorities will, and the cost charged to the owners of the property.

Another committee was appointed to make arrangements for a suitable entertainment in the near future—literary, music and, of course, a banquet.

Another meeting will be held in the city hall next Monday evening. Come.

And don't forget, everybody, to meet at the new auto park next Tuesday evening at six o'clock—prepared to do half an hour's work.

## Judge Watson Locates in Ashland
