Again Jacksonville Wins First Prize

Whenever Jacksonville enters a contest or goes after anything she usually "brings home the bacon."

Our people are greatly elated and have just reason to feel proud because the Jacksonville "float" carried off first prize in the parade at the Ashland celebration July 4th. Two years ago at the same place Jacksonville also was awarded first prize for its float, which represented "Pioneers of 1851."

The title or name given the float this time was "Pioneer Mothers of Jacksonville 1852." It represented the first white women to reach Jacksonville, which was the year 1852. The year before when gold was discovered here, and no preparation was made for women or families until a year later, when some of the miners built cabins and were joined by their families from Eastern states.

The two women who rode on this float—Mrs. Charles Berwert and two children and Mrs. V. J. Beach and little son—represented the first white women to reach Jacksonville, after a 6-months journey by ox-team. The woman standing on the float represented the mother looking anxiously into the forest for the return of the miners, while the other mother was baking bread at a camp fire, with their children clinging to their aprons as though afraid of attack by savage Indians, which were lurking all around them in the forest.

To make the scene more realistic, Frank Zell was also on the float, dressed to represent Chief John, the old Rogue River savage, and he was watching the white women and children through the brush, ready to attack them with a tomahawk.

The thousands of people who witnessed the parade pronounced this the most realistic and interesting float they ever saw. While there were many floats in the parade much more artistic and beautiful, they did not represent or mean anything in particular. But this one being of historic origin was vastly different, as it gave some idea of the dangers experienced by the early settlers who blazed the trail for civilization and changed this country from a savage wilderness to the grandest and most glorious country under the sun.

To Mrs. Alice Sargent belongs the credit of planning and directing both of these prize-winning floats—that of two years ago as well as this one. The Jacksonville C. of C. financed the float.

Aged Pioneer Makes Long Trip

Capt. O. C. Applegate, on the threshold of his 80th year, was among the interested delegates at the good roads convention held in Yreka Saturday by the Northern California Counties association. He drove down from his home at Klamath Falls and continued on to Orleans where he attended the celebration of the opening of the Klamath river highway.

From Orleans he continued to Arcata and returned via the Lassen highway through Weaverville, completing a trip of about 1000 miles in less than one week.

Captain Applegate was an officer in the Oregon state troops during the Modoc rising in 1872-73 and weathered the battles with Capt. Jack on the lavabeds.

Eighty years, hale and hearty, and with a memory as clear as that of a boy, Captain Applegate recalls the important engagements and dates as though they happened but yesterday. He stands erect, is a six-footer and has a white flowing beard, characteristic of the early western type.

Suit to Foreclose Mortgage.
