Beautiful Rogue River Valley

In passing thru the Rogue River Valley, tourists very often miss seeing many of the beauties with which this section abounds. The Pacific Highway, running as it does thru the lowest part of the valley, does not offer the best vantage point by any means from which to view the section celebrated as the "richest valley on earth." If one wishes to enjoy the scenery of this section they must take side-trips, leaving the main-traveled highway and follow the roads back into the hills.

On the west side many gold mines are located, few of them in operation it is true, but the "diggings" are there and they are very interesting.

The town of Jacksonville, to the west of Medford, offers the tourist many points of interest which he will do well to stop and investigate. The table rocks also offer a vantage point from which one can obtain a never-to-be-forgotten view of the country and one not lacking in historic interest.

The road up toward Mt. Wagner is also a beautiful side-trip with many nice vistas, and no one has seen the Rogue River Valley until they have given the orchard districts the "once over." To the lover of sport the Rogue River calls and along its banks one finds some very nice accommodations for the traveler. Among these, permit us to mention the Rogue Elk hotel, Prospect and Union Creek. The road to Crater Lake is now open, and then there is Diamond Lake, and Pelican Bay, both beautiful spots. Why, do you realize, friend traveler that when you are in Medford you are at the very center of things—you can go anywhere from here. Beautiful highways connect the cities of the valley into one big pleasure resort.

If going north you no doubt have seen Ashland and their wonderful park. If going south you can't afford to miss it. Ashland Park has few if any superiors in the world.

Take your time in looking around. Don't hurry. The beauties of the Southern Oregon country will thrill your soul as no other section can. The happy medium—the place you have been looking for. Don't wait until you are ready to retire and then come, but get a move on and come now.
