Medford Asleep At the Switch

(Mail Tribune)

There seems to be a disposition in Medford to regard the securing of new pay rolls in the city with indifference.

During the past few months Medford has lost at least two industries because other towns in the valley offered inducements and Medford offered none.

Of course, as everyone knows, there is such a thing as overdoing the inducement business. Substantial enterprises usually locate where business conditions are the most favorable, regardless of free sites, bonuses, etc.

But for Medford to get the idea that being the largest community in Jackson county means that everything desirable in the way of new pay rolls will fall into her lap, regardless of whether or not she raises a finger to secure them, would be both unwarranted and eventually disastrous.

There are rumors of various prospective enterprises nibbling about in this vicinity. Another saw mill, a match factory, even a Guggenheim railroad to the coast via Jacksonville.

These may be only rumors—probably are. But that does not justify Medford in sleeping at the switch, and resting under the painful delusion that if anything worth while does come it is certain to settle within her corporate limits.

Jacksonville discovered the danger of such an attitude nearly half a century ago, and as her present enterprising chamber of commerce demonstrates, profited by her lesson.

Even its enemies—if it has any—must admit that the Mail Tribune is a much better newspaper than is usually found in a town the size of Medford. It makes a specialty of giving the important news of the entire county at all times, and has many subscribers who take the paper for this reason. Many readers of the Mail Tribune in this portion of the county thought it very unusual and strange that not a line appeared in that paper about Ashland's celebration on the 3d and 4th, nor a word of mention about Jacksonville's float winning first prize and a Medford float winning second prize in the parade. Evidently it was a case of its reporters being "asleep at the switch"—or something of that sort.

For the month of June prohibition enforcement in Jackson county cost \$882.64, according to the records of the county clerk's office. The total fines collected for prohibition violations and convictions, according to the records of the county treasurer's office, totalled \$30. Under a law passed by the last legislature and now effective, the expenses of enforcement shall be borne by the fines collected, 25 per cent of the amount collected going to a "special state prohibition fund," and the remainder to the county.

At a meeting of the C. of C. Monday evening, among other matters discussed was the necessity of more hitching racks in town. Much complaint is made by farmers, who drive to town with teams, about the scarcity of racks for hitching their horses. Recently several farmers were heard to remark that they "guessed they would have to drive to some other town to do their trading, since there are no hitching racks in Jacksonville."
