News Items of Local Interest

County Clerk Florey and wife enjoyed a motor trip last week to Coos Bay, Crescent City and other coast towns.

Geo. Howard and family have returned from Diamond Lake, where they conducted the resort hotel during the last two seasons. George has again resumed his old position in the sheriff's office.

Geo. Handy and family, recently of Wellen, now occupy the Ernest Forman home near the courthouse. Mr. Forman and family have moved to their new farm home on King's Highway, south of Medford.

The Post is printed one day earlier this week than usual, owing to the Post force expecting to be absent from town for several days on business in California, our former home. Next week the Post will not likely be printed before Saturday.

The Jones residence property near the courthouse was sold this week to Ransom Drake and wife, recent newcomers from New Meadows, Idaho, who have moved into their new home. Their adopted daughter is expected to join them next week.

The burial of Silas Smith, who died Friday night of heart trouble at his home near Ruch, took place Monday in the Jacksonville cemetery. He was aged about 50 years and is survived by two sisters—Mrs. McDonough of Ruch and Mrs. Stevenson of Medford.

D. E. Hardman, our energetic garage man, has traded some Medford property to Glenn Bailey for the old Bailey livery barn in Jacksonville and will use it as a storage for autos, trucks, etc. He will lease the stock-feeding portion of the barn to some one who desires to look after that business.

E. Mandeville, an old and experienced shoemaker and cobbler, who conducted a shop at Central Point for a number of years, has bought the shoe-repairing outfit of the late W. R. Sparks and located in Jacksonville. He has rented the Green building on lower Main street and will use the front room for his work shop and the rear rooms for a residence for his family.

Sheriff Terrill left Wednesday with two county prisoners—Van Houten of Gold Hill and Murray of Los Angeles—both under sentence on bootlegging charges, for Portland, where they will be placed in that notorious rock-crushing health resort known as Kelly Butte. The sheriff also took two boys, Fred Reavis and Clint Duniway, of Medford to the state reformatory school at Salem, having been sentenced by Judge Gardner to that institution of learning—trades. No doubt a number of other county prisoners will be given a chance for a "workout" at Kelly Butte, as our jail is becoming over-crowded with guests—the registration yesterday being 22.

The boys expect to have a very good basketball team this year, as much good material is in sight.

Tennis has been taken up by the students of the high school. As one court was not sufficient to give all the students a chance to play a new court will soon be under way and the old one will be improved.

The Freshmen expect to become full-fledged members of the Student Body within the next few days. The other students are preparing to receive them with appropriate ceremonies.

The Senior class of Jacksonville high school is the largest that will graduate for many years, outnumbering any of the previous graduations by far. They have begun their senior year in a businesslike manner, having held a class meeting the first of last week and elected officers, as follows: President, Clair Coleman; Vice-Pres., Marguerite Sparks; Secretary and Treasurer, Berneice Reter.

Klamath Falls To Celebrate

Concerning the big celebration to be held at Klamath Falls on Friday and Saturday of this week, a Klamath Falls paper says:

Thousands of people from all parts of the Pacific Coast are expected to attend the pageant and spectacle, "The Passing of the Covered Wagon," to be staged here Oct. 12 and 13, featured by Indian tribal dances, athletic contests, decorated floats and spectacular exhibits of skill by lumber jacks, trappers, cowboys and others. The event bids fair to be one of the most elaborate of its kind ever produced in the West.

The production is being given by the Klamath Falls civic, commercial and industrial associations to celebrate the beginning of construction work by the Southern Pacific on its new railroad line from this city to Eugene, bridging the 118 mile gap between Kirk and Oakridge.

The Klamath Indians are donning their war paint for the first time in some fifty years. Council fires have been lighted on the reservation near agency headquarters about thirty miles from Klamath Falls. Several veteran chiefs and Captain O. C. Applegate, known among the Indians as "Bliwas," meaning the chief or big bird, are in attendance.

Captain Applegate was instrumental in inducing the Klamath Indians to go on a modern warpath as their part in honoring visitors here on Friday and Saturday at the Pageant "The Passing of the Covered Wagon."

It was "Bliwas" who largely was responsible for the ending of the Modoc uprising many years ago. He won the Klamath tribe to the side of the white settlers and later was credited with having gained for the loyal Indians a pension from the government officials at Washington. This accounts for Applegate's high position in the tribe.
