Sandfer Force Reduced to 3 Men

The prohibition enforce-
ment force for Jackson coun-
ty, whose expenses running
from \$850 to \$1500 a month,
the past year, have been a
thorn in the side of taxpay-
ers and the cause of wide-
spread comment, has been
reduced to three men—Sam
B. Sandfer, chief of staff,
his son-in-law, Victor Chap-
pell, and one "under cover
man," whose identity and
doings are supposed to be
veiled in mystery.

While no record has been
made of the clipping of the
dry strength, courthouse ru-
mor says that W. H. Leg-
gett "has been laid off for a
month" and the same fate
meted out to Clay Walker,
Ray Ingling and two or three
other specials called to ser-
vice in emergencies and oth-
er occasions.

dicate, which is operating
near Ashland. He feels sure

the prospect of completing
the road from here to the
Oregon Caves—35 miles west
of Jacksonville. He said he

paved from Medford to the
Caves, via Jacksonville and
Applegate.
