John Wesley Manning, a former sheriff of Jackson county, died Monday at his home in Klamath Falls and the burial took place in the Jacksonville cemetery yesterday forenoon. He was aged 88 years.

There will be revival services at the Pioneer Methodist Church beginning Sunday evening at 7:30 and continuing every evening until further notice. Revs. E. Lee of Medford, C. B. Davis, recently of Vermont, and Walker of Grants Pass will conduct the meetings. Everybody is welcome.

Mr. Larsen expects to return to Bisbee, Arizona, where he was formerly in the mining business. J. L. Roe acted as agent in this deal.

The family left Monday in their car for Fresno, Cal., where they will spend a few weeks with relatives before returning to Billings, Mont. The Royal Neighbors honored Mrs. Shoemaker with a most delightful farewell party Saturday evening at the home of Mrs. Terrill, with a splendid banquet as the feature.

J. J. Cambers of Ashland, republican candidate for sheriff, was in town Wednesday greeting old friends and making new ones. Before coming to Ashland 20 years ago he served as sheriff in Churchill county, Nevada, also as auditor and recorder of that county. Jacksonville High School News

Last Friday evening occurred two of the most interesting games of the basketball season, when the boys and girls teams played Phoenix High School. The Jacksonville girls won by a score of 55 to 22, while the boys game was tied at the end of the second half, and only by playing the extra five-minute period was the winner determined, when Jacksonville gained two baskets to the opponents one.

By the time this notice reaches the public the last tournament in basketball will be at hand. This will be held at Phoenix on Friday and Saturday of this week. According to plans worked out by the County Athletic Association at the meeting at Gold Hill last week, Jacksonville will meet Butte Falls on Friday.

Last Friday afternoon were presented in the high school assembly a list of awards won by pupils in typewriting on the Underwood contest material for the month of February. Clair Coleman, Cora Long, Jack Moore, Mildred Witter and Bernice Reter received diplomas for a net speed of more than thirty words per minute, according to International Contest Rules. Besides these, three pupils received the bronze medal of award for writing more than forty net words in the same contest. These were Mildred Witter at 40 words, Jack Moore at 42 words, and Bernice Reter at 46 words. Since this contest, however, these pupils have noticeably increased their rates and are going after higher awards. Clair Coleman has also just received membership certificate in the Order of Gregg Artists for contest material submitted in shorthand to the Gregg Company.

Mrs. Chas. Mitchell has returned to her home in Algoma, after a week's visit here with her relatives—the Coleman family.

Logging—one of the big industries of this section—is on again full-blast and hundreds of logs are being delivered daily by auto truck to the Medford mills.

The burial of Gottlieb Elksnat, who died at the county poor farm Saturday, took place in the Jacksonville cemetery Wednesday afternoon, beside the grave of his wife whose death occurred a number of years ago. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Edgar. He was born in Germany Feb. 2, 1842, and resided for a number of years in Wisconsin. He recently sold his home in Jacksonville, consisting of a small house and lot, to Bert Wilson, the auto stage driver.

Highway Board Approves Paving

The state highway commission Tuesday ordered advertising for bids for new road work in six different counties of Oregon. Among these are eight and a half miles of paving between Medford and Ruch—the 5 miles between Medford and Jacksonville and the balance between here and Ruch, at the Ruch end.

The highway commission is now advertising for bids for the work, and they will be opened March 29th.

It is expected that work will begin at once and rushed to completion as soon as possible, in order to accommodate the heavy traffic over this road. It is fortunate that there are two other roads between Jacksonville and Medford—not much longer than the main road which is to be paved—which can be used while this work is going on. It is the intention to have the paving completed by Sept. 1st.
