**Gold Hill Smelter
Big Aid to Miners**
(Medford Mail Tribune)

With a 100 ton smelter at Gold Hill and a sampling and testing plant at Grants Pass in operation, the southwestern part of the state will be well served with facilities for the determination and treatment of the ores from the various mines and prospects. Each plant will occupy a field of its own and each will be of material assistance to the other in building up a large and profitable business. The testing plant will furnish a means of determining the recoverable values, and thus pave the way for the investment of large capital in the development of the field, and will also provide a means where the prospector and miner of limited capital can have a cash market for small lots of ore—lots too small to send to the smelter—thus permitting him to continue the development of his prospect or mine without interruption to provide grub and powder money, as in the past, and the first thing he knows he will own a developed mine. The smelter must necessarily depend on developed mines for its large tonnage of ores; hence the testing plant will pave the way for the development of the new prospects into mines with large tonnage blocked out ready for the smelter. The two plants will not conflict, but in reality one is necessary to the success of the other.

The Medford Knockers Club, which has been trying to delay or knock out the paving of the Jacksonville road, have at last been forced to crawl into a hole and pull the hole in after them. A common ordinary skunk hole was big enough to hold them—there being less than half a dozen of the little fellers—accent on "little." Saturday Judge Thomas very properly dismissed or non-suited the attempted injunction suit started by the aforesaid non-taxpaying knockers club.

Mrs. Susanne Homes Carter, our efficient and popular school superintendent, will have no opposition in the coming election for that office. This decision by the voters of the county is a well-deserved compliment to Mrs. Carter, who of course thoroughly appreciates the honor. She has given most excellent satisfaction as head of our educational department and well deserves re-election.
