Paving of Road Is Under Way

D. O. Baker, superintendent, and H. Elliott, foreman, with a crew of men are busy preparing a foundation for the huge rockcrusher, asphalt heater, etc., at the west edge of town. The machinery is arriving and within a few days will be ready for action.

It is the intention to begin paving at the west end of Medford's Main street and work this way—thus leaving the road open for hauling asphalt from here by trucks. Foreman Elliott informs us that on this road about two miles per month can be paved—so that it should not require more than about ten weeks to pave between here and Medford. It is the intention then to move the crusher and plant to Ruch for the paving of the four miles at that end.

The work will start off with about 50 men, and since the contractors did not bring a crew with them they will depend upon local help—which will prove a great favor to the laboring men of Jacksonville and vicinity.

Mr. Elliott, the foreman, recently completed a lime mill and plant near Huntington, Baker county, which cost more than a million dollars.

Jacksonville High School News

The tests for the six-week period were held last week, and some of the high school pupils received rather low marks in some subjects, thus indicating where intensive work must be done during this last six weeks of the school year.

The high school play has been rehearsed nearly every evening for some time and the preparation shows up well, tho the date of presentation is uncertain because one of the chief members of the cast is out with the mumps.

Joe Sullivan is obliged to be absent from the track meet Saturday, thus lessening the outlook for Jacksonville, for he was listed for some of the events. Tryouts for the events are being held this week. The meet will be held on the fair grounds and will last all day.

Last Friday afternoon the boys and girls baseball teams went to Talent and played games with the teams there. Our boys won by a score of 31 to 5 and the girls won, 27 to 14. Wednesday afternoon the girls beat Phoenix, at that place, score 20 to 16. This is quite an achievement, as the Phoenix team is rated as being especially strong.

Wednesday evening the "Barney Googles" entertained the "Spark Plugs" with a feed. The banquet was held in the assembly room after a ceremony of presentation of the basket ball letter-sweaters by Mr. Cook. The red sweaters for the boys and the white ones for the girls make very neat and serviceable garments, as well as a conspicuous showing of the high school letter.

Milam Jones Escapes From Jail

Milam Jones, one of the most dangerous criminals in the country, who had been held in the county jail here for several weeks under \$5000 bonds, charged with highway robbery, made a sensational escape Wednesday evening and is yet un-captured.

About 7:30 o'clock Jack Robison, the jailer, opened the door to admit two trusty prisoners who had been doing some work around the courthouse. The instant the door swung open, Jones, who stood just inside, leaped like a panther upon the jailer, striking him viciously with his fists in the face. Robison, who is a small man, clinched and fought like a tiger but was soon overpowered by Jones, who is a giant in size and strength. Jones grabbed the jailer's gun and with it struck him a murderous blow on the head, cutting a frightful gash but failed to knock him down. He still clung to the prisoner and yelled for help. Jones, in his mad desire to escape, tried to kill the jailer and snapped the gun twice with the weapon against his breast. Fortunately, during the struggle two cartridges fell out of the gun, which is of old style, and the hammer snapped on these two empty chambers—thus miraculously saving the jailer's life.

Jones then escaped by running south, through William Schmidt's house yard, and as he entered the timber he fired several shots—perhaps as a warning that it would be unhealthy for anyone to follow him.

Sheriff Terrill with a posse at once started in pursuit, but up to noon today he has not been recaptured. Thursday morning he was seen in the timber on Forest creek, five miles west of here, by some school children. He has relatives on Williams creek and near Grants Pass and it is thought he will try to reach them on his way out of the country.

Another prisoner—Manuel Terres, a Mexican, escaped from the jail at the same time but was recaptured near the schoolhouse within a few minutes.

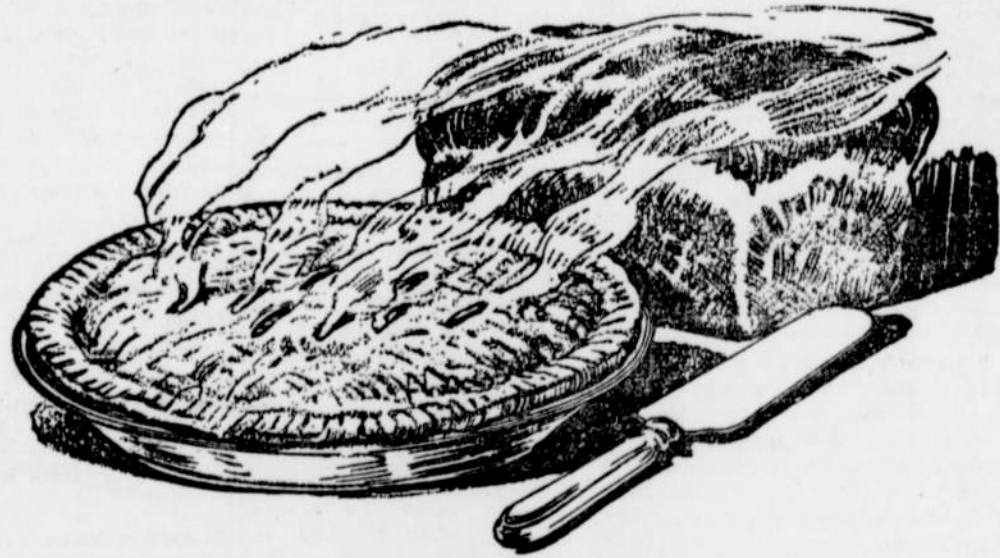
