Jacksonville Post Changes Hands

The Jacksonville Post—plant, buildings and real estate—has been sold, the new owner to take charge at once.

Mrs. Blanche Cook, recently of Mount Morris, Ill., who has successfully published newspapers in that state and Iowa for a number of years, is the new editor and owner. The lady spent a couple of weeks here a year ago and was so well pleased with this portion of the country, and Jacksonville particularly, that she decided to buy the Post property and locate here. She and her son Robert arrived here Friday, having driven through in their car.

Mrs. Cook has the ability and energy to make a complete success of the business and no doubt will be able to improve the paper in some respects.

All unpaid subscriptions to the Post are payable to the new publisher, also all local and commercial advertising from June 1st, and all legal advertising except the legal notices which expire with this issue.

After a vacation of a few weeks in the mountains, during the hot season, it is our intention to embark in another line of business.

We desire to thank the Post's army of patrons for their good will and patronage and hope that the same liberal and courteous treatment will be accorded the new publisher.

In conclusion we will add that the Post has worked unceasingly every issue for the betterment and advancement of Jacksonville and this entire community—and the result proves that our efforts have not been a failure. Since we took charge of the Post nearly three years ago the population of the town has about tripled—so have the values of real estate and rents, with the future prospects of the town looking brighter than perhaps ever before. More real estate deals have been made here in the last 3 years than for 30 years before. We are not claiming all the credit for this most welcome change, but all who are competent to judge as to the merits of a newspaper say that the Post is entitled to a good share of this credit.

Exams for Teachers' Certificates

Examinations for state certificates will be held at Jacksonville commencing at nine o'clock Wednesday, June 11, and continuing until Saturday afternoon of the same week.

Applicants must present themselves for the examinations they wish to take at the time set for the question envelopes to be opened, as the examinations cannot be offered at any other time or place. The rules and regulations regarding the examinations will be read at 9 o'clock on the morning of the first day. Those entering later in the week and wishing to take only a few of the examinations should present themselves at the secretary's desk for registration and for information regarding the rules.

The eleven subjects required for a one-year elementary certificate are U. S. History, Writing, Physiology, Reading, Arithmetic, Grammar, Geography, Theory & Practice, Spelling, School Law and Civil Government.
