Uncle Sam Will Learn
 Why Underwear Shrinks

Washington.—The Department of
 Commerce has instituted a sweeping
 investigation into the shrinkage of an
 underwear. Assistance of the bureau of
 standards and makers of underwear
 was enlisted to help solve the mystery,
 and a meeting of manufacturers was
 called for May 7. The effect of soap
 laundry machines, wringing, pressing
 and finishing, as well as the tension of
 mangle machines will be studied.

Fruit Has Three Tastes
 Washington.—A new fruit that tastes
 like a combination of banana, pineap-
 ple and strawberry, has been discov-
 ered by Dr. Wilson Popenoe, explorer
 for the Department of Agriculture.
 The chloite is found in Guatemala
 and will grow anywhere, according to
 Doctor Popenoe.

The longest existing continuous
 rainfall record is that at Padua, Italy,
 which has been kept since 1725.

Lays Double-Yolk Eggs
 Princeton, Minn.—An occasional
 double-yolk egg means nothing to A.
 N. Davis, a local resident. He has
 been showing his friends a box of prize
 eggs. The average length is a little
 more than three inches and the cir-
 cumference six and one-half inches,
 and each egg contains a double yolk.
 Mr. Davis has one hen in his flock
 that regularly every day lays a dou-
 ble-yolk egg.

Sell Unprofitable Stock
 Get busy improving your live stock.
 Get rid of the unprofitable animals on
 your farm. Labor is too high to em-
 ploy it in milking cows that produce
 only 125 to 150 pounds of butter a
 year, and corn is too expensive to feed
 a hog that is brought to a weight of
 only 200 pounds at nine months of age.
 Improve the breeding as well as the
 method of feeding your stock and
 make every pound of grain and every
 hour of labor count as much as pos-
 sible.

STATE NEWS IN BRIEF.

St. Helens.—Lumber shipments for the week ending Saturday were slightly more than 5,000,000 feet from the local mills.

Salem.—Rhea Luper, state engineer, Saturday received a petition request-
 ing him to take over and regulate the
 division of water between the various
 ditches diverting water from the De-
 schutes river.

Salem.—A total of \$81,110 was turned
 over to the state treasurer by the
 state land department during the
 month ending May 31, according to a
 report prepared here by George G.
 Brown, clerk of the state land board.

Astoria.—During the past few days
 407,000 cutthroat trout eggs have been
 taken to the Necanicum river trout
 hatchery by C. P. Smith, deputy state
 game warden. The eggs came from
 Montana. About 1,000,000 fry are be-
 ing reared at the Necanicum hatchery.

Salem.—Fire conditions in Oregon
 are more hazardous at the present
 time than at any corresponding season
 of the year in the history of organ-
 ized forestry in the west. This was
 the substance of a statement given out
 here by F. A. Elliott, state forester.

Eugene.—The Eugene chamber of
 commerce gained approximately 200
 members during the past year, accord-
 ing to a report made at the last
 weekly luncheon of the season Friday.
 No members have been lost, it was
 stated, and the debt of \$750 has been
 wiped out.

Salem.—There were two fatalities in
 Oregon due to industrial accidents dur-
 ing the week ending May 29, accord-
 ing to a report prepared here by the
 state industrial accident commission.
 The victims were Gentry O. Sims,
 Coquille, faller, and Edward L. Doby,
 Baker, farmer.

Salem.—In event there are no more
 outbreaks of the foot and mouth dis-
 ease in California prior to June 3
 Governor Pierce will issue a proclama-
 tion on that date lifting the quaran-
 tine now in effect in Oregon against
 the importation of citrus fruits raised
 in the former state.

Gaston.—If rain does not fall in this
 part of the Willamette valley in a few
 days the crop of spring and fall-sown
 grain will be a short one. A good
 soaking downpour would mean thou-
 sands of dollars to the farmer. The
 grain is just heading out and it is not
 too late for it to fill, if there is plenty
 of moisture.

Eugene.—After July 1 no smoking
 will be allowed on the Salt creek
 watershed and the Western Lumber
 company and Davis Weber Lumber
 company timber sale areas in the
 vicinity of Oakridge in the Cascade
 national forest, according to announce-
 ment by Nelson F. McDuff, supervisor
 of the forest.

Oregon City.—The cannery at Car-
 ver, owned by the Clackamas County
 Canning company, opened Friday on
 the 1924 crop of berries, with a crew
 of 30 workers. From Friday morning
 to Saturday afternoon six tons of
 strawberries and gooseberries were
 canned. The plant will continue opera-
 tions during the summer, finishing
 with apples and pears in the fall.

Vale.—The sheriff's office was busy
 this week with moonshine raids, mak-
 ing three in Juntura and bringing back
 to the county jail a prisoner from
 each raid, two men and a woman. The
 men, O. D. Acton and Lloyd Edmon-
 son, each running a pool hall and cigar
 store, were given heavy sentences for
 possession of intoxicating liquor, and
 the woman, Mrs. Mary Kelley, was fin-
 ed for manufacturing.

Pendleton.—Beginning last Monday
 all campers who build fires in the
 Umatilla national forest will be re-
 quired to have campfire permits, ac-
 cording to a statement at the local
 forest service office. The ruling has
 been made in an effort to prevent fires
 in the forest. There is greater risk
 of heavy losses this season than for
 several years on account of the dry
 weather, according to the statement.

Klamath Falls.—An option was
 taken here Saturday on 39 acres of
 Klamath Falls property by Southern
 Pacific representatives and, according
 to local reports, it will be utilized for
 switching, shops and roundhouse facili-
 ties for the main division point on the
 new Eugene-Klamath route. Up until
 this move by the railroad the location
 of the division point on the new road
 had been a matter of much conjecture.

Vale.—While other seek their for-
 tunes by endeavoring to find oil, gold,
 silver, and other valuable articles in
 the hills of eastern Oregon, J. E. John-
 son of Vale is busily engaged in mix-
 ing that indispensable household com-
 modity, salt. For this purpose the
 Vale Salt Fields company has been
 organized with a capital stock of \$15,
 000 under directorship of John E. John-
 son, senior member, and is now six
 months old.
