

AMERICAN MINING CONGRESS

Sacramento, Calif., Aug. 18.—The big industrial interests of Northern California are eagerly awaiting the twenty-seventh annual convention of the American Mining Congress in this city the week of September 29th and have assured their support to the Department of Mines and Mining of the Sacramento Chamber of Commerce in entertaining the gathering.

Action taken at a regional industrial conference held in Redding, California, on August 8th and 9th, assures an interest in the convention wider than mining and puts the business world of Northern California solidly behind the platform of the mining congress.

Resolutions adopted at the conference, which was attended by more than 100 representatives of the lumber, powder, agricultural, transportation and mining interests, call for the creation of federal and state departments of mining, with a secretary of mines in the president's cabinet; for the California Development Association to establish a bureau of mines as part of their organization; for the con-

Closing of additional areas on the Mt. Hood and Whitman National Forests has just been authorized by District Forester Geo. H. Cecil of Portland. This action was taken at the request of the supervisors of these two forests.
On account of the extreme fire danger the number of man caused fires, these areas are closed to camp fires, smoking and the use of matches, according to the report. Under the instructions of the District Forester no permits will be issued for traveling on these areas.
