RESOLUTION NO. 113

BE IT RESOLVED by the CITY COUNCIL of the CITY of JACKSONVILLE, OREGON:
That the City Council deems it expedient and necessary and declares it to be the intention of said council to improve that part of FIFTH STREET in said City of Jacksonville lying between the south line of D Street and the south line of California Street by the construction of a concrete curb along the easterly and westerly boundary lines of the aforesaid portion of said street, except street intersections, and by paving all that portion of the aforesaid street between said curbs and the pavement now constructed upon said portion of said street, including the unpaved portions of the street intersections, with a bituminous concrete pavement of a thickness of 4 inches, all in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates of said improvement as prepared by the City Surveyor now on file in the office of the City Recorder, which plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.
The City Council after due consideration finds, determines and declares that all and the only lands benefitted by said improvement are the lands abutting upon said improvement for a distance of 100 feet westerly from the westerly line of said improvement and for a distance of 100 feet easterly from the easterly line of said improvement and all property within said boundaries shall be assessed for the cost of said improvement, except the cost of paving street intersections which shall be paid by the city. Said assessment district shall be designated as "Street Assessment District 2."
The City Surveyor's estimate of the probable total cost of said improvement is \$3400.00.
Property owners within said district are required to file with the City Recorder within 15 days from the posting of a copy of this resolution any objection or remonstrance they may desire to make to said improvement.
The foregoing RESOLUTION No. 113 was passed by the City Council at its regular meeting held August 12, 1924, and submitted to and approved by the Mayor on the same date.

VOLT FEATURES ENTERPRISES

The last number of the Volt, Copeco's monthly publication, features an article covering one of the latest and most up-to-date ice and storage plants in the northwest. This plant, which has just been completed by the Medford Ice and Storage Company, is located at Medford, Oregon, and is said by experts to be the last word in modern ice-manufacturing equipment.

The various phases of ice-making are discussed at length in this article which also devotes considerable space to the technical details of the improved type of electrical equipment which has been installed in this new plant. Several good photographs of the large cooling tower, the engine-room and other details of interest are reproduced in this number.

A story of the annual "mid-summer musical event" of the Pacific Coast is also contained in this issue and describes the recent production of the opera, "Robin Hood," which was presented at the Jackson County Fair Grounds. Lack of space has prohibited a detailed description of this spectacular open-air production which has taken its place among the really worth-while dramatic events of the year. This year's presentation was witnessed by a representative gathering from all parts of southern Oregon and northern California and it is predicted that next year's offering will be attended by people from points as far north as Portland and as far south as San Francisco.
