Many Visit Washington.

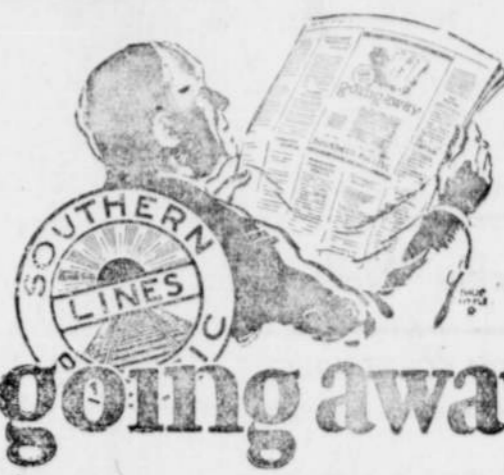
