FACTS AND FIGURES

Things about Southern Central Oregon in general, especially that section embraced in the territory lying between Bend and Silver Lake, and between the Cascade and Paulina Mountain Ranges. An area of over 1,000 square miles.

East Lake.

A summer resort 16 miles east of LaPine, situated in the crater of an extinct volcano, 8,000 feet above sea level. The lake is fed from the depths of the old volcano by hot springs, while around its shores are numerous springs of exceptional medicinal value. Open from June to October each year. No post-office, mail goes to LaPine.

Crane Prairie

One of the finest scenic spots in the world. A vast prairie hundreds of acres in extent, situated in the Cascade mountains, 5,000 feet above sea level, 18 miles west of LaPine. Headquarters for cattle men during the grazing season. Surrounded by picturesque mountains. Good hunting and fishing. Mail goes to LaPine.

Fremont

First town south of LaPine on the Silver Lake road, nestling along the edge of the Fort Rock valley. Has one or two stores, a blacksmith shop, stage station, etc. Named in honor of General Fremont, who is assumed to have been the first white man to visit the valley. A very attractive little place, and one to be long remembered by the tourist. Mail from LaPine.

Fort Rock

A prosperous little town situated in the heart of the Fort Rock valley, so named because of a massive circular fort-like volcanic crater protruding abruptly from the level plain. History attributes the

use of the natural fort to the first white settlers in withstanding the attack of Indians. Has several thriving business establishments, a postoffice and daily stage service.

Crescent

A well established town on the Klamath Falls stage route, headquarters for Forest Rangers for that district. A favorite stop for tourists, 17 miles southwest of LaPine. Has good accommodations for automobilists. On the right-of-way of two railroads which are soon to be built. A very promising little city. Has numerous business establishments, a postoffice, tri-weekly stage service from LaPine.

Rosland

A pretty little settlement on the Little Deschutes river a mile north of LaPine. Was established by the late J. S. Bogus over twenty-five years ago. Was formerly the site of several business establishments that are now located at LaPine. Is situated at the junction of the road to Pringle Falls, Fall River and Big River Ranger Stations. Mail to LaPine.

Pringle Falls

On the Big Deschutes river 9 miles northwest of LaPine. Site of a proposed power plant; is being considered as a power station for electrifying one of Oregon's railway systems. Has a small sawmill, several good buildings, and good camping grounds. No post-office; mail to LaPine.

LaPine

A live-wire town in the Walker Basin, the distributing point for an area of over 1,000 square miles. On main automobile road from The Dalles to California. Daily stage service to and from Silver Lake, Fort Rock, Fremont, Bend. Tri-weekly stage service to and from Crescent, Fort Klamath and Klamath Falls. Headquarters for tourists. An enterprising town, surrounded by large irrigation project. Good dairy country. Some good homestead land still available. All level land, no rock, soil is a mellow disintegrated volcanic ash. Good water. Plenty of wood for fuel. LaPine has general stores, garages, hardware store, hotel, restaurant, bakery, bank, Forest Service building, good school, churches, newspaper, Commercial Club, sawmill, and the usual number of small businesses found in a small town. It is on the right-of-way of two railroads, which are soon to be built, good automobile roads and adjoins vast forest of yellow pine timber which is now receiving the attention of several large milling interests that contemplate the erection and operation of a very large mill close to the town.
