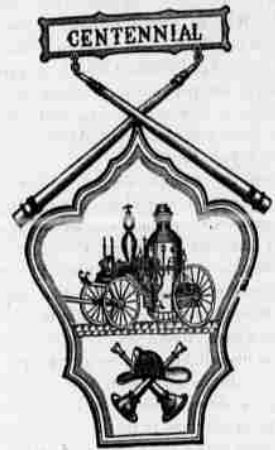

The Prize Medals manufactured by this firm for the victors in the different games and contests of skill which are to take place in this city during Centennial Week, may be seen on exhibition in their show window. Nearly six weeks were occupied in their construction, and upon their examination the most unprejudiced will feel assured, and give it as their unbiased opinion that the labor and money are well expended. For the next four weeks they will be the center of attraction, the passer-by being irresistibly drawn by these specimens of the goldsmith's art. Their value is about \$1,000. The intrinsic worth of the larger medals is almost precisely the same, and one would be at a loss which to choose if allowed the privilege. The design of each is different, original and unique, and creates a longing to be the possessor of such rare and costly ornaments. Some beholding them the contestants have become aroused to greater ambition, and daily practice among rowers, base ball players, marksmen, turners and others in the order, each determined to put forth greater exertion to win these very desirable evidences of superior skill, and what will be considered years hence as honorable hairpins to bequeath to future generations. There is yet another unfinished, designed for the most skillful billiard player, which, when completed, will fill a vacant niche on the pedestal.

CENTENNIAL WEEK IN PORTLAND.

Throughout the broad extent of this great Republic our fellow citizens are making preparations to celebrate with becoming ceremonies the Centennial anniversary of our Nation's birth. One hundred years ago the comparative handful who peopled the Colonies of North America, struggling for Freedom against the armies of the most powerful nation of the earth, published to the world their Declaration of Independence, and through danger, toil and self-sacrifice, achieved their freedom, and our people took rank among the nations of the earth. Since then a century has rolled by, a century of unprecedented progress for us as a people in Commerce, Population, Sciences, Arts, Wealth—in all that contributes to the essential growth of a prosperous nation. The great section of country, which in the early days of the Republic was a vast wilderness, has become fruitful under the hand of the husbandman,—is

the busy mart of commerce and manufacture and is thronged with vast numbers who give allegiance to our common country. The white sails of our commerce are filled by the breezes of every clime; our flag is borne upon every sea and commands respect from all the nations of the earth. All this has been the work of the hundred years just completing their course, and the history of nations offers no parallel to such advancement. With hearts truly grateful to the beneficent Providence which has thus blessed and prospered us our citizens, cherishing the memory of those who won for us the privileges of a free people, and desirous of suitably commemorating the day which forms so marked an epoch in our history, are making extensive preparations all over the land for the proper celebration of the approaching Fourth of July. We who have made our homes on this far North-western Coast, claim in common with our fellow countrymen this birthright of freedom, and to have equal share in the traditions and glories

of our native land, and being so far distant from the great center where the masses of our people will congregate, should testify our patriotism by gathering at some convenient place and uniting in the general rejoicing. The citizens of Portland, recognizing the fact that our State, since its inception, has kept pace with the general advancement, and realizing the foremost position our city holds on this northern coast, deem it just and proper that they should take the initiative in this matter, and have accordingly made full arrangements for ceremonies fitting the occasion. It is proposed to continue the celebration in our city four days, namely, the Fourth, Fifth, Sixth and Seventh of July, for each of which days a distinct programme will be arranged. Every effort will be put forth to make this a marked era in our history, and one which will tend to strengthen and perpetuate the patriotism that has always characterized our people.
